**Saving Of The Party.**  
When John A. Cooper, of the Canadian Magazine, in St. Catharines, pictured England as contributory and indirectly to bribery and corruption, he had not read the accounts of the last elections. Barrels of money were put in circulation, large sums for what may be termed "legitimate expenses," and still larger sums for what may be called illegitimate expenses. There has not been an uncovering so far of the irregularities, but this may come in time.  
Mr. Cooper is referred to as one of the young men whose candid talk is refreshing. And it is. He is a member of a ward association in Toronto, because he thinks everyone should be in politics. But he says his party, the conservative, is disgraced because some of its members have been insisting upon the spoils system. Not only has boss rule triumphed, but politics have been carried into municipal affairs and partyism has reached its lowest depths.  
It is not going to cure things to talk of the conservative party having been too long in power in the dominion. The party was defeated in 1896, and had become reconciled to its lot when the Ontario government went down, and some of the wildest excesses have since been indulged in. The correction of all this is not a little candid criticism, as the Toronto News remarks. If the conservative combination is dissatisfied with the run of things it is for the members of it to do as the liberals were advised to do prior to the last provincial election, and as many of them are credited with doing.  
The independent liberals helped to defeat the Ross government. So the independent press alleged. It is for the independent conservatives to vote against the Whitney government now in North Toronto, and teach it a lesson, which it greatly needs. Mr. Foy thinks a reverse would be an awful reflection upon the government, but something will have to be done, apparently, to save the party.

**The Facts Are Awaited.**  
There is a great outburst of indignation on the part of the conservative press because Judge Prendergast, of Prince Albert, Sask., has allowed the ballots in a certain election in connection with which three returning officers had confessed to wrongdoing and been fined.  
The point is that the polls at Pine Point, Sandy Lake and Bear Lake were not opened at all, that the returning officers men elsewhere, prepared a list of voters who were alleged to have exercised the franchise, and inserted in the ballot box a corresponding number of ballots. The result was a majority of 151 for Dr. Tyman, liberal, who was so impressed by the stories of unfairness that some time ago he said he would not consent to profit by them.  
What moved Judge Prendergast in his decision one cannot tell. The judgment, or the substance of it, has not been printed, and in the absence of fuller particulars the abuse of the judge is not in order. The Toronto News, which is the hottest in its comments, "makes no charges against the judge or Scott governments," and does not say that either "was mixed up in the dirty business." Neither does it make charges against Senator Davis or Hon. Mr. Lamont, both of whom were active in Prince Albert campaign. But unless the premiers take action in the case they "will rest under a grave imputation."  
Just so. But they should have the time and the opportunity for investigation, and it will be time enough to blackguard them when they have the evidence of wrongdoing and fail to act upon it. The liberal party does not condone any scandal in this case, or raciality. Neither does the premier of the dominion or the premier of Saskatchewan.

**Warning To Whitney.**  
The conservative press of Ontario denials that the Whitney government has committed itself to the spoils system. But the Montreal Star has been sounding the situation, as it is revealed in the Ontario press, and assumes that the obnoxious thing has been adopted. Thus it remarks:  
"From various parts of Ontario come unpleasant indications from time to time that pressure is being applied to the members of the Whitney government to exhibit more briskeness in distributing the 'spoils of victory.' Nothing could be more stupid from a purely partisan point of view; nothing more unfair to Mr. Whitney and his colleagues; and nothing more directly contrary to the public interest."  
If the conservatives of Ontario are determined to set up a party gullotine, it is very certain that a similar instrument will be set in active motion at Ottawa, and the country will witness the undisciplined and inflammatory spirit of two rival party "masses" in progress at the same time.  
"Nothing suffers more from the 'spoils system' than the guilty political organization, unless it be the country in the character of 'innocent bystanders.' Patronage, even when fairly administered, is the curse of ministers. When unfairly administered, it becomes the nemesis of the entire party. The Whitney government began business in a manner which gave the province and its well-wishers good reason for encouragement; but it has not found the path of decency any easier to tread than have other governments, harassed by a company of 'camp followers.'"  
The Star cannot be accused of any fondness for the liberal party. It has contributed directly and indirectly towards the defeat of that party, and has been independent only during the lulls between elections. The advice it gives, therefore, will be appreciated by the Whitney people.

**Man Confined in Penitentiary is Anxious.**

Acting Chief Adams was to-day handed a letter by the postmaster, which was dated February 13th, and which was written by Rev. Canon Cooke, chaplain of the Kingston penitentiary. The letter was written at the request of a Peterboro man who is at present doing time in the penitentiary for horse stealing. He has written to his wife to claim a number of times, but has received no reply, and he wants to know her whereabouts and also concerning his family. His wife, it is stated, is at present living with an Italian, who has received considerable notoriety in the police court.

**LIBERAL CONVENTION.**  
Proposal to Hold One is Being Discussed.  
Toronto, Feb. 21.—A proposal to hold a big convention of the liberals of the province is under quiet consideration by the liberal members of the legislature, and it is not unlikely that a monster gathering, similar to that held in the fall of 1904, will be convened about the close of the present session, probably in April.  
The object of the convention will be to bring solidify the party, preparatory to the next struggle which, time brings round with marvellous rapidity. It is even mentioned that at such a meeting Hon. G. W. Ross may retire from the leadership, and his mantle be placed on younger shoulders.

**To Ask For A Subsidy.**  
Leamington, Ont., Feb. 21.—During the coming session of parliament, A. H. Clark, M.P., for South Essex, will urge the government to grant a subsidy of three thousand dollars to establish a mail and transport service between the mainland and Pelee Island, the lack of which last year led to heavy losses to the island farmers. Mr. Kuhlman intends to build an elevator on the island if the government will give certain assistance to him.
