DISHONEST MILK SUPPLIES. Practice of Tampering With Milk is Increasing.

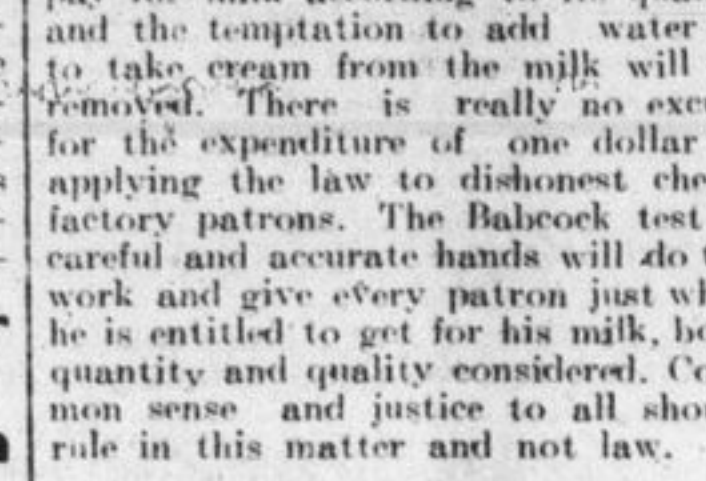
Farming World, Toronto. According to the reports of Chief Inspectors Pablow and Barr as given at the recent dairy convention, the practice of adding water to or taking the cream off milk supplied to the cheese factories of Ontario is on the increase. Evidently increased skill and intelligence as applied to dairying does not always make for honesty and square dealing. The inherent tendency in mankind to get something for nothing will now-down. The evil is not new, however, and has been with us since those days when dairy-



ing was of minor importance to Canadians. The practice is not at all general and only unscrupulous individuals here and there attempt it, yet it is sufficiently general to blast the good name of Canada and to bring reproach upon the dairymen of this country. This has been done to a large extent, but the evil continues to thrive. At present the law is applied through the inspectors employed to aid in improving the quality of our dairy products. But this is not satisfactory. The inspector should not in any sense act the part of a detective. It makes his work less effective and a lot of valuable time is wasted that should be better employed. If the law has to be applied to make patrons honest the milk or a special committee connected with the factory should enforce it and not the instructor.

But there is a better way than all this of discouraging the practice. Let the cheese factories of this country pay for milk according to its quality and the temptation to add water or to take cream from the milk will be removed. There is really no excuse for the expenditure of one dollar in applying the law to dishonest cheese factory patrons. The best and most careful and accurate means will do the work and give every patron just what he is entitled to get for his milk, both quantity and quality considered. Common sense and justice to all should rule in this matter and not law.

A New Cut in Aprons.



Every housekeeper should possess a goodly supply of aprons, and especially those of gingham or cambric, ones which cover the skirt entirely and have some form or other of waist strap in the way of a bib. The illustration shows the apron skirt in full length. The front panel continues above the waistline to well over the bust, and to the sides of the apron are attached the shoulder straps, which continue down the back and fasten to the buttoned waistband, and in the front form the large pockets on either side of the front panel. A cross-strap in the back holds the shoulder straps in place, keeping them from falling off the shoulders.

Milk Pail Ideas.

The cost of keeping a cow is in proportion to her weight; but the yield in butter is not in such proportion. It is almost wholly in the breed, care and methods of feeding. The richer the feed the better the butter and the more valuable the manure. The principal advantage with Jersey milk is that the proportion of all its solids are greater and of water less than the average milk. Ropy milk is caused by bacteria, but it is not yet known how this bacteria gets into the milk unless it is from the body of the cow. Wash the udder teats and body of the cow before milking; also, see that the vessel and hands of the milker are clean. The animal heat in the milk should be removed as soon as possible by passing the milk over a cold surface or through a pail surrounded by ice. Don't wet the cow's teats in milking. The practice is a filthy one, and renders clean butter making impossible.

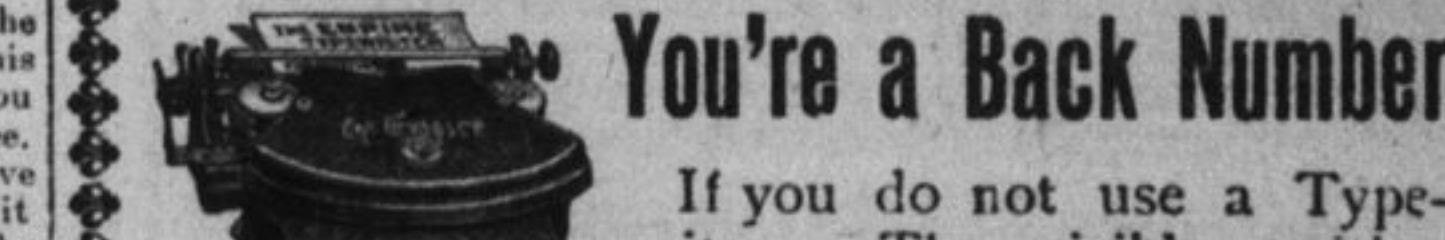
