COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

What is Going On in the Business World—The Markets.

A water works and sewerage system will be installed at Dalhousie, N.B. An electric lighting and power system will be installed at Northam, N.S. An electric light system will be installed by the Dalhousie, N.B. town council. Gosport, Ont., may expend \$250,000 on a municipal power plant for electric lighting etc. A new pumping station, to cost about \$25,000, will be considered by Moncton, N.B., council. The fallures in Canada for the past week were twenty-two; same week, 1905, thirty-eight.

The stockholders of the Chase mills, Fall River, Mass., voted to purchase the Burlington cotton mills at Burlington, Vt., for \$240,000. At the annual meeting of the Bell Telephone company it was decided to increase the capital from \$10,000,000 to \$20,000,000. The board of directors will be increased by those of whom one will be H. D. Warren, Toronto. The other two will be from Western Ontario and Manitoba.

It is stated that Charles J. Coll, of the Acadia colliery, Stellarton, has purchased the coal areas of the Cumberland Coal & Railway company, located at Houghton, in close proximity to the workings of the Cape Breton Coal, Iron & Railway company.

Besides being a prominent member of the board of directors of the C.P.R., Mr. Hooper shows a lively interest in twelve other important companies doing business in this country.

Large Turnout; Eggs and Butter Plentiful; Fowl Dear.

A charming spring-like day brought out a large number of farmers, butchers and gardeners on the Market Square on Saturday morning. Not for several weeks has such a rushing business been done. Eggs and butter were an unusually heavy supply and the plentifulness kept the prices low. Eggs sold from 15c. to 22c. a dozen and butter brought 20c. to 23c. a lb. Fowl are scarce and dear; chickens, 70c. to 90c. a pair; fowl, 80c. to 81 pair; turkeys, 11c. to 12c. a lb.; ducks, \$1.25 pair; geese, \$1 each.

Some fine apples were shown on the outside, at \$1.25 to \$3.50 a barrel, according to quality. Potatoes remain \$1 a bag. Notwithstanding the mild weather, most remained at last Saturday's prices. All the florists were out with their beautiful spring blossoms, which were readily sold. Buying was steady.

TS Take Charge of the New York Branch.

His local business will be conducted under his supervision during his absence. He expects to leave on Tuesday so as to take over the office in New York on Thursday. The offer of the New York agency to Mr. Fair is a flattering one to a local insurance man.

The Marine School.

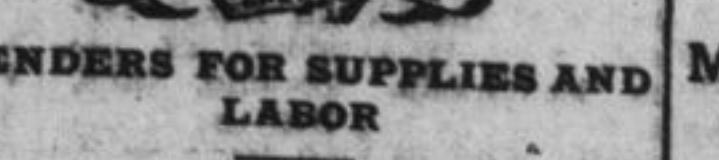
