THE CITY COUNCIL
**SUM OF \$300 GRANTED FOR
 EXPENSES**

Of Normal School Deputation—
 Old Boys' Association Asks
 for \$500—City Officials and
 Their Relation to Politics.

At the city council meeting last evening, Mayor Elliott presided. Present were: Aldermen Abbott, Angrove, Bassam, Carson, Cooke, Cooper, Craig, Elliott, Gaskin, Givens, Hoag, Kent, Millan, Nickle, Rigney, Ross, Sands and Toye. The following communications were referred to committees:

City officials asking for a Borough's adding machine.
 Bunker & Gump, London, asking council to petition the legislature for increased powers to deal with transient traders.
 John M. Whinton, applying for the position of plumbing inspector.
 H. Meek, secretary, House of Industry, calling attention to trespass on the House of Industry property.
 Lieut. Col. Williams, notifying council that the application of council for the water lot at Macdonald Park had been approved.
 Frontenac Cereal Company offering broken stone for sale.
 H. Newman, callman, of fire department, asking for an increase of \$80 in salary.
 P. G. Suddard, applying for position as fireman in light department.
 Charity Circle King's Daughters asking for aid for the family of John Hynes.
 D. A. Davidson, asking if the council will rent the fair ground.
 Donald Guthrie, inspector of registry offices, calling attention to certain registry offices needed at local registry office.

Grant To Deputation.
 John McIntyre, K.C., and William Kelly, present to ask the council for a grant of \$300 to defray the expenses of the deputation which was going to Toronto to urge upon the government the establishment of a normal school in Kingston. Mr. McIntyre pointed out the necessity of the other places in Eastern Ontario, where the school, Mr. Kelly said, he hoped the city council would give, was in its power to the deputation.

In reply to Ald. Craig, Mr. McIntyre said it was proposed that the deputation would consist of at least twenty; there might be twenty-eight.

Ald. Elliott said he was of opinion that the citizens should pay for the expenses of the deputation. It was only right that they should. However, he thought it was unnecessary to send such a large deputation. Only a couple of speakers could be heard by the cabinet ministers. Ald. Elliott said that although he was one of the city council's representatives appointed to co-operate with the Board of Education in the matter, he had not once been invited to attend any of the meetings. That, he thought, was a reflection on the city council. Mr. McIntyre and Mr. Kelly in reply stated that if Ald. Elliott had received no notice to attend it was an oversight.

Ald. Givens moved, seconded by Ald. Craig, that the council grant \$300 to defray the expenses of the deputation, and that the finance committee be requested to provide the funds.

Ald. Gaskin said that the larger the deputation the better effect it had. He took this stand, that those citizens who were included in the deputation should pay their own expenses. He had always done so when on deputations in Kingston's interests, and would do so in this case.

The motion of Ald. Givens was carried.

Old Boys' Deputation.

A deputation was next heard from the Kingston Old Boys' Association, consisting of Mr. Pense, J. M. Shaw, P. Daley, S. M. Newton, D. J. McDermott, Dr. Morgan, Dr. G. W. Bell, and others. Mr. Pense stated that the association had decided that a large triennial union should be held this year. He made two proposals: (1) That the city council take charge of the celebration, or (2) that it back up the association by a grant of \$500. The support of the council must be had. It was necessary to get \$25,000 for the project. J. M. Shaw pointed out the benefit of the merchants got from the old boys' reunions. Besides, these affairs were of great value in advertising the city.

Ald. Elliott moved that the finance committee be requested to provide \$500 for the old boys' celebration and that the council appoint a committee in conjunction with the association.

Ald. Elliott opposed the motion, thinking that the council should be given more time to consider the question. He didn't think that the association expected the council to take immediate action, as Mr. Pense had advanced two proposals, which should be considered in detail.

Ald. Gaskin said he was opposed to a grant to any such affair. If the merchants were to benefit let them put their hands in their pockets and pay. He would put his hand in his pocket and pay his share, but he couldn't vote in favor of a grant from the city's taxes.

Ald. Hoag, while in favor of a grant, said he preferred that the matter be first referred to a committee for consideration.

Ald. Kent moved in amendment that the question be referred to the finance committee. He wanted to give the matter more consideration.

Ald. Abbott said it was showing a small spirit on the part of any alderman to throw cold water on the project. The city would be more than doubly paid for the expenditure.

The proposed grant. The council should look at the matter in a more liberal spirit.

Ald. Angrove said he was in favor of the grant. It was better to make it now, so that the association could get to work at once.

Ald. Carson favored referring the matter to the finance committee.

Ald. Elliott moved in amendment that the council should refer the matter to the finance committee.

Ald. Gaskin repeated that he was opposed to any grant. He was in the council to prevent such voting away of the public's money. What good would the old boys' celebration do the city? he asked. The city's population had not been increased through them.

The amendment of Ald. Kent referring the question to the finance committee was carried.

Mr. Pense said they could not depend upon the merchants for subscriptions. The merchants claimed that they got little benefit from the crowds which visited the big cities. Upon the assistance of the city council would depend the holding of the celebration. Without a grant of \$500, the project could not be financed.

Municipal Liabilities.

Regarding the recommendation of the board of works that the council should authorize the city engineer to inspect the municipal sewers, so far as it implies civil liability on the municipal corporation for non-repairance, the act imposing a very heavy responsibility on municipalities where injury results from non-repairance of the sewers, practically making ratepayers the insurers of all persons walking or driving on the highways.

Ald. Nickle opposed the city council adopting the petition. He moved in amendment, seconded by Ald. Abbott, that the council adopt the following: "That the convenience and welfare of the public require that the highways, streets and bridges of the province be kept in an efficient state of repair, and that where damages are suffered through the failure of a municipality in the performance of its duty in this respect, justice demands that compensation be made him."

Ald. Nickle disagreed entirely with the opinion of the city solicitor who favored the petition. Ald. Carson said he was in favor of adopting the petition, but he didn't want the clause in the report, and have the city solicitor present at the next council meeting to discuss the question.

Other Reports.

The council authorized the chairman of the board of works and the city engineer to proceed to Ottawa for the purpose of inspecting the city of Ottawa water-macadam plant, and for the purpose of explaining to the militia department the requirements of the city in connection with the water lot at the foot of O'Kill street.

In connection with the water works report, Ald. Angrove and Gaskin said that it was unfair to give flat rates to hotels and refuse them to manufacturing concerns. Some principle should be adopted whereby the water treatment should be accorded everybody.

The city property report recommended that the contract for erecting a new weigh house on No. 2 market be awarded to W. J. Chapman, his tender being \$520 being the lowest.

Ald. Gaskin moved, seconded by Ald. Carson, that the report of the city property committee be referred back and that the committee be instructed to first consider the question of building the weigh-house on a site on the continuation of King street, about a block further east, so as to improve the locality.

Ald. Carson said that by building on the proposed site, \$60 would be saved in building a drain that was necessary.

Ald. Angrove, chairman of the city property committee, said his committee had considered the whole question. The city engineer had reported that to make the change asked for by the petition would cost the city an extra \$300 or \$400.

The amendment of Ald. Gaskin was lost on this division.

The city property report was adopted.

Civic Officials In Politics.

The following resolution was moved by Ald. Elliott and seconded by Ald. Carson: "That from and after the passing of this resolution no permanent officer or servant receiving pay from the corporation, shall be a candidate for or take part in the election of any candidate for the office of mayor, or other member of the council, or the Board of Education, or the legislative assembly of Ontario or the domestic parliament, otherwise than by recording his vote as an elector, in violation of the terms of his resolution, he shall forfeit his position and the same shall be considered vacant."

Ald. Gaskin said he hoped that Ald. Elliott would hold this resolution over as an important question, and time should be given the discussion, and consider it. He was in favor of part of it, and would like to express his opinion upon the question later on.

Ald. Elliott said he did not want any city official placed in the position of a Montreal official who recently went out, and worked in an election and whose "head came off" for doing so. City officials should leave politics strictly alone. A polling booth in Ritten ward, he came against a fireman not working in an election when he had moved, he thought to be the right thing, and he hoped to have it unanimously adopted.

THE PLUMBING BY-LAW.

Ald. Nickle introduced for its second reading the old plumbing by-law, which was passed by the council of 1903.

Ald. Elliott held that the by-law could not be considered just now, as the board of works had the matter before it, and had not reported.

The mayor said that the by-law was in order for a hearing, if Ald. Nickle would present it. The latter said he did want to present it, but he had been asked by several doctors not to allow the matter to stand any longer.

Ald. Carson said that the board of works could have a report upon the appointment of an sanitary inspector for the council's next meeting. He had in view the appointment of Superintendent Hewitt, of the water works, to perform the duties in connection with his present duties.

Ald. Nickle pressed for a division on his motion for a second reading, and was defeated on this reading, and "Yes—Alds. Angrove, Nickle, Ross—3.

Nays—Mayor Mowat, Alds. Abbott, Bassam, Carson, Cooke, Cooper, Craig, Elliott, Gaskin, Givens, Hoag, Kent, Millan, Rigney, Sands, Toye—16.

It was after eleven o'clock when the council adjourned.

FIRE AT ROCKWOOD.

The Roof of the Engine Building Destroyed.

At four o'clock this morning, fire broke out in the boiler and engine building at Rockwood asylum, the blaze originating near the roof. The employees at a short time got it under control, but it broke out again, and Dr. Ryan telephoned to the city to ask the mayor to send out a portion of the fire brigade for protection.

The mayor gave Chief Elmer orders to lead the asylum fire team, the Chatham engine, a hook and ladder wagon and a hose wagon were dispatched in charge of the chief and seven or eight men. The brigade finally extinguished the blaze after a couple of hours' work. The roof of the building was completely destroyed and the building itself gutted. Dr. Ryan stated that the damage would not exceed \$200 or \$300. The engines were not working order again, and the institution did not suffer any for lack of heat.

Only by the most energetic efforts of the fire ladders was it that the heating apparatus for the main building, was not entirely damaged.
