DEFECTS IN THE ARTILLERY SCHOOL HERE.

ck of Proper Appliances-Col. Drury, Inspector of Artillery, Never Reported Anything Wrong-Some Militia Officers Incapable.

The appointment of a commission by the minister of militia to enquire into the alleged deficiency of the school of artillery at Kingston has created much talk in military circles. Each year a certain number of militia officers from various parts of Canada come here for artillery instruction which is given by officers and non-commissioned officers of the R.C.H.A., which was organized as a teaching staff. It is said that t instruction has been given in a desultory fashion and that there are not sufficient appliances for instruction purposes. The commission will have to determine on whose shoulders rests the responsibility for the lack of appliances, which lack is well-known to exist. However, the former inspector

FOUR KILLED IN ATTEMPT TO CAPTURE FUGITIVE.

Robber Held Town Hall-Was Flooded Out by Firemen After Defying the Police for Three Hours.

Helsingfors, Finland, March 2.- The pursuit of the bandits who, last Monday night, entered the Russian state bank here, killed the guardian and se cured \$37,500, resulted yesterday in another highly dramatic incident and cost four more lives at Tammersfors, where two of the fugitives were cornered. One of the bandits got possessession of the town hall and held it for hours, but finally was subdued by a stream of water directed by the firemen. 
