SMITH'S FALLS MADE OTTAWA HUSTLE.

Cup Holders Won Last Night's Game by Only 6 to 5—Ottawa Was Not as Strong as When They Played Queen's.

At Ottawa, last night, the Smith's Falls team was defeated by six goals to five in the Stanley cup match. At half time the score was three to three. At various periods the Smith's Falls team led, and it was not until near the close of the match that Ottawa got the lead and won out. Ottawa scored the first goal in one minute. Smith's Falls got the second. Alternate goals followed right through. The match was quite a rough one. R. McDerrett, of Montreal, was referee. The final match will be played to-night. The majority of goals count. Ottawa was not as strong as when they played Queen's last week. McFie has not been himself since Saturday night's match in which he was hurt. Then H. Furthermore, the Ottawas have been overworked and are becoming stale, after playing five hard matches in ten days. No team can stand such a strain.

The latter have a little better defence, while Queen's is a little better on the line. There is still a chance of Smith's Falls winning one, as it is a fresher team than Ottawa. If the latter gets H. McDerrett, it will win out.

General Notes On Sport.

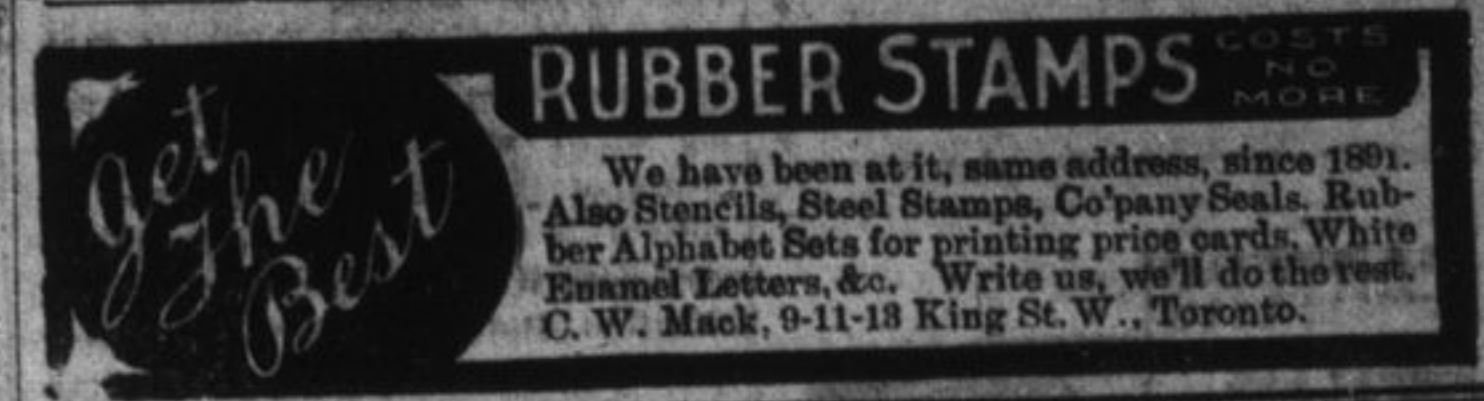

1,600 Varieties of Farm Crops to Be Tested.

The members of the Ontario Agricultural and Experimental Union are pleased to state that for 1906 they are prepared to distribute into every township of Ontario material for experiments with wheat, clover, roots, grains, grasses, clovers, and cereals. Upwards of 1,600 varieties of farm crops have been tested in the experimental department of the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph, for at least five years in succession. These consist of nearly all the Canadian sorts and several hundred new varieties, some of which have done exceedingly well in the carefully conducted experiments at the college and are now being distributed free of charge for co-operative experiments throughout Ontario.

Each person in Ontario who wishes to join in the work may choose any one of the experiments for 1906, and apply for the same. The material will be furnished in the order in which the applications are received until the supply is exhausted. It might be well for each applicant to make a second choice, for the first could not be granted. All material will be furnished entirely free of charge to each applicant, and the produce of the plots will, of course, become the property of the person who conducts the experiment.—J.
