PHILANTHROPY ENDS WITH HIS DEATH.

Lord Newlands Declares in Will That He Has Horror of Posthumous Beneficence-Asked to Pay Pensions.

London, March 8 .- Philanthropic cirles were startled yesterday when the will of the late Lord Newlands, of Barrowfield and Mauldslie castle, Lanark, was read. During his life time Lord Newlands took an active interest in charity,

contributing several thousand dollars year to various organizations. When Lord Newlands fell ill two weeks ago and when, a few days later, all hope for his recovery had been abandoned, it was said that before the Newlands made out a will, leaving his entire fortune to charity. After his death his administrator

nnounced that there were no quests to charitable objects. 
