---"LAZIFST MAN ALIVE"

Artful Dodger Hand Work. London, March 8 .- The "laziest man

alive," in the person of Ralph Shackle, a strong, healthy looking man, thirty-live years, of age, appeared in court this week for sentence as an incorrigible rogue and vagabond.

The prosecutor gave some facts to show that the man's nickname has not been unjustly bestowed. He said Shackle had been convicted six times for refusing to maintain himself and seventeen times for refractory conduct in the workhouse; on three occasions the maximum term of twelve months' hard labor was imposed and twice he had been threatened with a whipping. He absolutely refused to work, and spent his time between jail

In 1900 he was dispatched to an agricultural colony in Surrey, and after a few days was sent out with a horse and cart. He set the horse cart into a ditch, and then marched back to London.

KINGSTON.

a Normal School Centre-The Case Made Out by the Deputation-The Premier Says That Kingston Will Not Be Punished.

The cabinet ministers who received the Kingston deputation in Toronto on Wednesday were Premier Whitney and Hon. Messrs. Pyne, Willoughby, Monteith. Cochrane and Matheson. The deputation was really an Eastern Ontario one, as it consisted also of these eastern members of the legislature: Messrs. Dargavel, Preston, Carscallen, Gallagher, Paul, Ferguson and McGarry, who all supported Kingston as a normal school centre. One half hour was given the deputation, which was introduced by Mr. Dar-

Mr. Pense was the first speaker. In a two-minute, speech, he pointed out the general advantages afforded Kingston. He was followed by Messrs, Gallagher and Paul, members for Frontenac, and Addington respective

Principal Ellis said that Xingston and public school pupils enough to afford practical training for 200 nor mal school teachers in training. T. J. Rigney pointed out that Kingston was the diocesan see of an archdiocese and was in the same position as Ottawa and Toronto, both of which has normal schools.

Dr. Knight made this point Kingston's favor-that the teachers-intraining would get the benefit of the apparatus in the laboratories of the schools throughout the province, he said, were poorly equipped for teaching science, and no less than seventeen collegiate institutes and high schools were better equipped in this regard than was the normal school at London. It was most important in Kingston, so that the teaching in science would be thorough. All , the

H. W. Richardson spoke as president of the Kingston Conservative Association. He said that while Kingston didn't "deliver the goods," of late, still it had sent to Toronto conservative members, when the conservative party were in opposition, and needed help. He hoped Kingston would not be punished, because in that city there were obstacles to overcome in political contests that no other place had. Conservatives of many outside places favored Kingston as a normal school

D. M. McIntyre pointed out that if the advantages of Kingston struck Dr. Ryerson, superintendent of education under the Sandfield Macdonald government in the carly seventies, to such an extent that he selected a lot and decided to build a normal school there, the present government should struck in a like manner and more so because the advantages Kingston affords have been so augmented.

Rev. Principal Gordon spoke of the advantages Queen's would afford to the normal school, whose teachers-intraining could avail themselves of the individual classes in the university and so better themselves.

The great demand on the government's time had prevented this, but he hoped to do so this week, when the government did have an opportunity to consider it.
