DR. PYNE IMPRESSED WITH THE ADVANTAGES OF KINGSTON.

As a Normal School Centre—The Case Made Out by the Deputation—The Premier Says That Kingston Will Not Be Punished.

The cabinet ministers who received the Kingston deputation in Toronto on Wednesday were Premier Whitney and Hon. Messrs. Pyne, Willoughby, Monteth, Cochrane and Matheson.

Principal Ellis said that Kingston had public school pupils enough to afford practical training for 200 normal school teachers in training.

T. J. Rigney pointed out that Kingston was the chosen site of an archediocese and was in the same position as Ottawa and Toronto, both of which had normal schools.

Dr. Knight made this point in Kingston's favor—that the teachers-in-training would get the benefit of the apparatus in the laboratories of the School of Science.

H. W. Richardson spoke as president of the Kingston Conservative Association. He said that while Kingston didn't "deliver the goods," of late, still it had sent to Toronto conservative members, when the conservative party were in opposition, and needed help.

D. M. McIntyre pointed out that if the advantages of Kingston struck Dr. Pyne, superintendent of the normal school, under the Sanfield Macdonald government in the early twenties, to such an extent that he selected a lot and decided to build a normal school there, the present government should be struck in a like manner.

Rev. Principal Gordon spoke of the advantages Queen's would afford to the normal school, whose teachers-in-training could avail themselves of the individual classes in the university and so better themselves.

In reply to the deputation, Hon. Dr. Pyne, minister of education, said: "The educational policy of the government is not yet crystallized, but we are delighted to learn that so far as we have gone we have the endorsement of prominent educationists.

Premier Whitney said that nothing that had occurred or could occur in Kingston would affect the government in the slightest degree in regard to the grant for medical purposes to Kingston, the premier said he had hoped to be able to make an announcement before now.
