Opposed To The Races.

The local government will think seriously about the effect of it before amending the law and openly permitting of horse racing in connection with the local fairs.

It is no excuse to say that the races have occurred, though the performance has been disguised and not called by its proper name.

The county show cannot afford to have membership in the larger trotting associations, and so these rules are not satisfactory.

The people, representing various moral agencies and movements, and principally the clergy and churches, have been vigorously protesting against the proposed change in the law.

The municipal association, some time ago, sent a deputation to the government to argue or reason against the bill, and the speakers were repulsed.

Resuming the discussion of the light, heat and power committee's report, for the information of the people, the Whig reverts to a point in its previous article, namely, that on account of "maintenances" the sum of \$10,000 will have to be expended this year from current revenue.
