

DEALT WITH AT THE MARINE SCHOOL.

By Capt. Thomas Donnelly-The Importance of Having Vessels Fully Equipped With Good Life Boats and Life Preservers. In spite of the inclement weather and many counter-attractions, the attendance at the marine lecture, last evening, was quite large.

> "It seems a small matter," said the lecturer, "to talk to you mariners about the necessity of plugs in each ifeboat, and yet if you read the account of the Valencia wreek, where so many lives were lost on the Pacific coast, you must be moved, as I have been, at the account of how bravely he small boy kept his finger for hours, inserted in the plug hole to keep the water from coming into and swamping the lifeboat. It was crim inal negligence for the master or mate of that steamer to neglect to properly outfit the lifeboats, and if the inspector did not do his duty when inspect ing this steamer he ought to be held

> By several illustrations, Capt. Don drill each week, if crews were to b kept efficient in handling the boats He showed how the carrying capacity of the boats was figured out. He said that not enough encouragement was given to the carrying of life rafts passenger steamers navigating rivers, as these have been proven to be the most efficient part of the equip ment of passenger steamers, as they are always ready and do not requir launching. In this respect the Ameri can inspection rules had always been

He then took up the question ife preservers, showing the differen nakes and styles in use on Canadian and other steamers. He explained how solid cork was the best and only material that should be used for life preservers, and how dangerous his preservers might become if stuffed with rushes, cork shavings or loose granulated cork, and as an illustration gave an extract from the report of the investigating commission or he experience at the Valencia wreck. He called special attention to the necessity of placing the life preservers in convenient and accessible places, and mentioned several cases where the life preservers could be found stored away where it would be impossible to av hands on them in case of accident

Capt. Donnelly then gave a half our talk on cross-bearings, showing how easily the mariner could deter mine the exact position of his shi hours, he thanked the sailors for coming out on such a stormy night, sizes.
