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LIVE STOCK MARKETS.

Montreal, March 19.—About 700 head of butchers' cattle, thirty-five milk cows, 300 calves, 10 sheep and 100 fat hogs were offered for sale at the east end abattoir to-day. The butchers were out strong, but trade was rather slow, as higher prices were being asked for nearly all sorts of cattle. Prime beefs sold at 47c to 51c per lb.; pretty good cattle, 32c to 41c; and the common stock, 24c to 31c per lb. There were a number of superior cows brought from Toronto, and from \$55 to \$70 was asked for them, but the buyers did not appear willing to pay so much; and other cows sold at \$20 to \$30 each. A pair of large calves were sold for \$30; the others were young veals, which sold at \$2 to \$4 each. Sheep sold at about \$2 each, or 41c to 61c per lb. Good lots of fat hogs sold at 71c to 73c per lb.

CANADIAN FRUIT

WILL BE SHOWN IN ENGLAND NEXT YEAR.

New Fruit Marking to Be Adopted—Stock Transactions of Insurance Companies Honest—One Company Over Stated Receipts.

Ottawa, March 21.—The proceedings at the insurance investigation commission, this morning, were rather tedious. Mr. Blackader's examination being continued by Mr. Shepley. Sun life directors were on hand, and filed statements in reply to what appeared to be reflections on their business methods, as given in evidence yesterday. The peculiar stock transaction was shown to be all right so far as honesty was concerned, and the company neither gained nor lost by them. It was stated by Mr. Blackader that the Independent Order of Foresters, in 1898, paid \$30,000 to organizers, and \$37,000 additional for expenses. This amount has been increased since. In 1898, the receipts were overstated \$20,000.

At the Dominion conference of fruit growers, this morning, it was decided to do away with the system of marking fruit by X's, such as XXX, XX, etc. Similar markings were adopted, namely fancy No. 2, and No. 3. It was suggested in a resolution that manufacturers of preserves, jams, jellies, be compelled to print prominently on their productions on their labels, in a resolution thanking the minister of agriculture for his support, it was suggested that Canadian fruit be exhibited at the next fall show of the Royal Agricultural Society, England. The steamer Sovereign, burned at Lachine, and sunk there, will be raised by the Donnelly Wrecking company.
