### DENIES STATEMENT THAT ACCOUNT BOOK IS NOT THE SAME.

R. H. Fair and County Clerk Edwards Have Warm Passages—Mr. Fair Refutes the Clerk's Assertion.

On the county council meeting on Wednesday afternoon, a report upon the Kingston and Perth Road company's affair was made by the clerk, who showed that the cash balance in the report presented to the council last November by him were exactly the same as those in the books of the company. He declared that the book brought to the council chamber by Mr. Fair now was never shown him before, and, therefore, his figures were not taken from it. The clerk held that there was no reason for the complaint of Mr. Fair. The balance of his and the balance of Mr. Fair proved to be exactly the same.

Mr. Fair, in reply, said he expected to have a report from the committee appointed. He didn't dispute that the balance corresponded, but he objected to the manner in which the details were presented. Mr. Fair declared that he would make oath that the book he brought to the council chamber was the same one over which Clerk Edwards pored for an hour in the speaker's house when he took off the statement. It was a shame and a disgrace that the clerk should make such a statement that the book was not the same one. He held that the statement in the November minutes was incorrect and misleading.

Councillor Sproule held that the committee appointed should bring in a definite report. He thought there was a lot of personal feeling in connection with the matter, which the council had nothing to do with. Mr. Fair replied that he was there simply to place the company right in the eyes of the people.

Councillor Spour stated that the committee would report on Thursday morning.

Councillor Spour presented the report of the committee on printing, which recommended that the printer of the Whig, being the lowest, be accepted. The report was adopted.

**Thursday Morning Session.**  
At the Thursday morning session, Councillor Pillar presented this report: "We, your committee, appointed to compare the books of the Perth Road company with the report printed and issued by the county clerk on behalf of the county, having made the comparison and the balance of December, 1902, and December, 1903, being admitted by Mr. Fair as being correct, and that the balance carried over in each year was found to be correct, we have come to the conclusion that the printed report is correct and that the amounts in dispute are only a matter of book-keeping, and as the results are the same, we therefore, recommend that the report of the clerk be sustained." On motion of Councillor Pillar, the report was adopted.

An agreement with the township of Kennebec was passed, providing that the Cross Lake bridge shall be maintained as follows: The county to pay seventy-five per cent. of the cost and the township twenty-five per cent. that the county shall do the work and charge the township its share.

The property committee's report recommending that the clerk write the county engineer requesting him to hand over all books and papers in connection with the York Road, and a statement of all material on hand, was adopted.

The finance committee recommended that extension of time till June 1st, 1906, be granted to A. Howie for payment of toll gate dues that \$70 be accepted from Mr. Walker in full payment of his indebtedness. The report was adopted.

**Arbitrator To Be Named.**  
Three petitions were received from over sixty ratepayers in each of the townships of Lohborough, Kingston and Storrington, to the following effect: "We, the undersigned, being at least fifty ratepayers of the township, do hereby respectfully petition your council under 'The Toll Roads Act,' 1901, Edw. VII, c. 33, for the appointment of an arbitrator under the provisions of Section 4 of said act, for the purpose of settling the tolls on the Perth to Kingston, and which is known as 'the Kingston and Perth Road,' your council having failed to agree with the owners or lessees of said road in accordance with the provisions of section 3 of said act."

Councillor Pringle wanted to know if Councillor Stames was the father of the petitions. The latter admitted that perhaps he was; there had to be a father to all such reforms. He pointed out that the act required that the county council must appoint the arbitrator as asked for by the petitioners. The petitions were in accordance with the act, and, therefore, an arbitrator must be appointed within sixty days.

Councillor Sproule suggested that Clerk Edwards would be the proper arbitrator for the council to appoint. A man was wanted who had no financial interest in the road.

Councillor Sproule said he was in favor of leaving the petition to the toll roads committee with power to act.

### WANTS FAIR GROUNDS FOR SPORT AND AMUSEMENT PURPOSES.

City Property Committee Asks More Information—All Vehicles Must Be Taken Away From The Fair Grounds Forthwith.

At the city property committee yesterday afternoon, there were present Alderman Agnew (chairman), Millan, Cooke, Harkness and Cooper. Inspector Guthrie of registry office, drew the attention of the city to repairs and additions necessary in the city registry office, on account of the dampness from the roof and the ground, there is a great danger of the documents being seriously damaged. The committee decided to defer the matter till it knew what appropriate it would have for the year.

On communication of D. A. Davidson, asking for the privilege of leasing the fair grounds for horse racing, sporting, general amusements, poultry shows, and stabling. Ald. Harkness suggested that the grounds be offered to Mr. Davidson for \$300 for the remainder of the year. The ground cost \$17,000. At present there was a deficit of probably \$1,500 a year on it. Five hundred dollars was considered a small figure.

Ald. Cooke said he couldn't support any proposition to rent the grounds until he knew exactly what they were going to be used for. Ald. Millan pointed out that the grounds could not be used for anything illegal. "Mr. Davidson might intend to bring some gaudy girls there," remarked Ald. Harkness, but even that possible attraction did not satisfy Ald. Cooke. It was decided to instruct the clerk to write to Mr. Davidson and secure from him full particulars, in regard to what he wishes the grounds for.

The communication of the city engineer for larger office quarters was left over till the next meeting when the committee would know the appropriate site would have.

The chairman said he had instructed the caretaker of the fair grounds to supply him with a list of all articles on the grounds, and in the buildings that did not belong to the city. The caretaker's report showed that there were about seventy-five wagons, sleighs, ploughs, etc., there. Ald. Agnew said that he had a number of articles for storing hay in a building, it was unfair not to require all others to pay for storing their property.

On motion of Ald. Harkness the committee decided that persons having articles in the fair grounds must remove the articles forthwith.

Ald. Millan and Harkness claimed that the city shouldn't go into the storage business at all, in competition with citizens who had places for storing vehicles, etc.

The petition of J. J. Carrington and others asking that a continuation of River street be allowed through the smelter site to the water's edge, was considered. The petitioners want the right to go over the smelter site as far as reach the water. At present the bridge will allow traffic over the site. Ald. Cooke said that an arrangement might be made with the next lessee to allow people to cross over the field to the water's edge. It was decided to get full information regarding the smelter site before taking action and also to visit the place.

**To Give Testimony.**  
Among the witnesses who have been subpoenaed to attend the preliminary hearing of the conspiracy charges against the officers of the Dominion Wholesale Grocers' Guild, at Hamilton, are some of the wholesale men, who, it is alleged, fought the guild before joining. One of these, Andrew McLean, head of a Kingston house, is said to have some very interesting correspondence with the guild before coming into the fold. Several of the letters read last week, says the Hamilton Times, spoke of McLean as being one of those who was largely responsible for the Robertson Co., of that place, fighting the guild so long, because he would not live up to the rules.

**Teachers Ask Increase.**  
The public school teachers in many towns seem to be much agitated over the latest question. Inspector W. G. Kidd has been in receipt of many letters from places in Eastern Ontario, as to the rate paid the dominies of the local student population in the halls of learning. In some towns the teachers have formed a union to demand an increase in salaries—even a penny is in the race for dollars.

**HOW IT IS VIEWED.**  
Whitney's License Law Displeases The Liquor Men.

The Whitney government's increased license charge does not meet with favor on the part of the liquor men. The number of licensed places was to be reduced to a large extent, it might, but with the cutting off of only a couple of saloons in Kingston, the change in the license law simply means a crack at the liquor men, who will have to pay a larger license for practically the same business they are doing.

"That's what the liquor men get for supporting the Whitney government," said a liberal to a conservative hotel man. "It is chiefly the liquor interests that object to Whitney, and now his government is pandering to the temperance people."

"The raise of the license," said an hotel man, "will mean the cutting out of all five-cent whiskey. Ten cents will be the lowest charge for a drink of liquor. That will hit the working man harder than anyone else. It simply means that the people who drink will have to pay the additional \$170 license fee."

The temperance people are highly pleased over the new license bill, though they would rather have had a greater reduction in the number of licenses. They, however, think the hope for local option is killed by the demands made as to the majority required to carry it.
