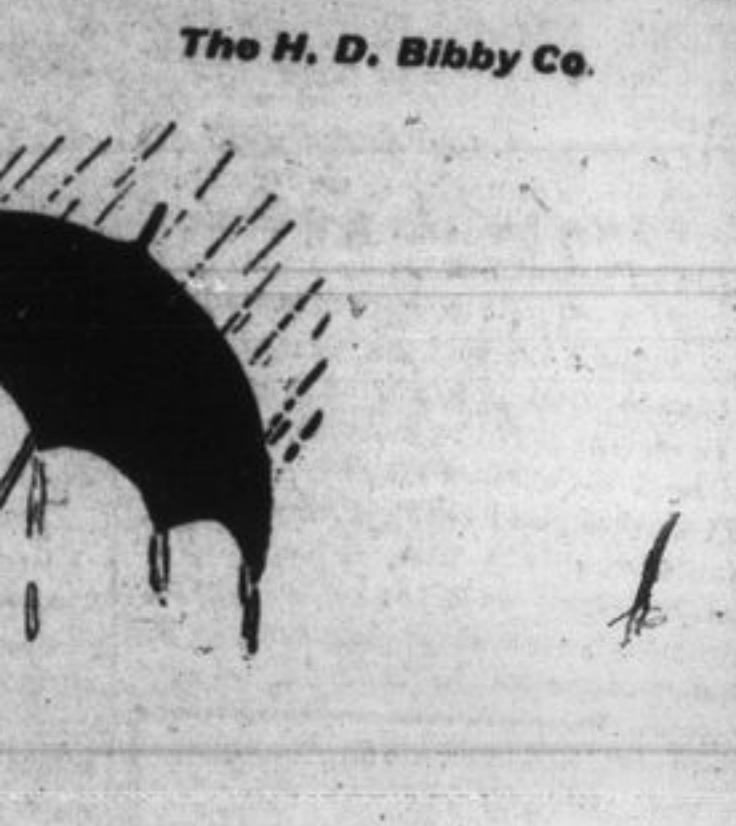

OFFICE HELP SLACK

WAS MR. FITZGERALD'S PLEA AT INVESTIGATION.

Companies Ordered to Hurry Information Along as Quickly as Possible-List of Trustees for Foreign Securities Read. Ottawa, March 28.-(The insurance investigation resumed, this morning. There was a lot of technical evidence, and the examination of Mr. Fitzgerald was continued.)

The lack of office help to cope with growing duties was again emphasized, and Mr. Fitzgerald will place in writing his estimate of the help needed. As evidence of the growing work, there were 29,261 policies in Canada in 1906, held by a group of foreign companies inspected that year, and these increased to 45,730 in 1905. A list of trustees for foreign securities was read, Commissioner Langmuir being named as a trustee for the New York Mutual company.

The annual meeting of the Dominion Rifle Association is in progress here today. Col. Gibson, Hamilton, presiding. There is a large attendance and interesting speeches were delivered by the governor-general, Sir Frederick Borden, R. L. Borden, Gen. Lake, Lord Ashby and others.

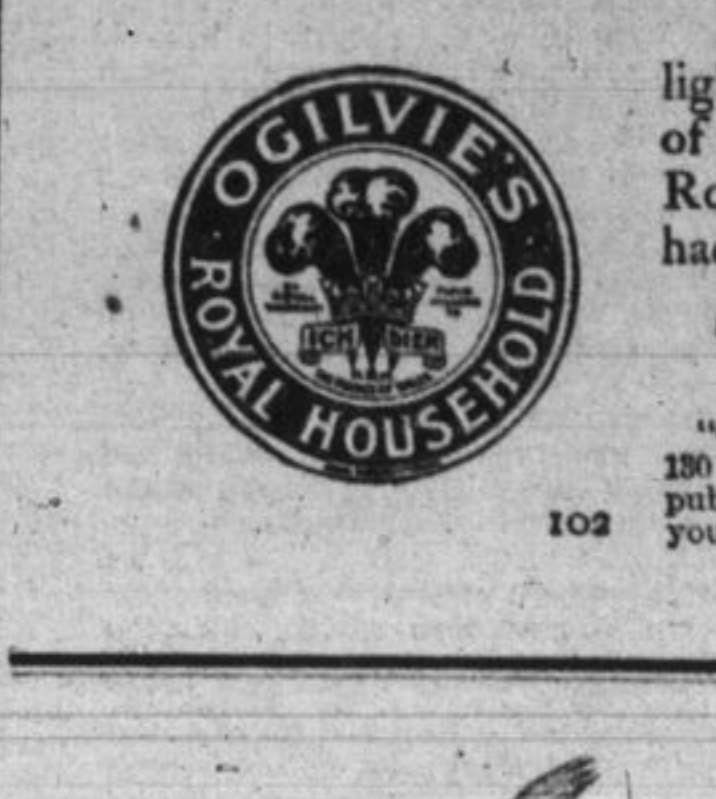

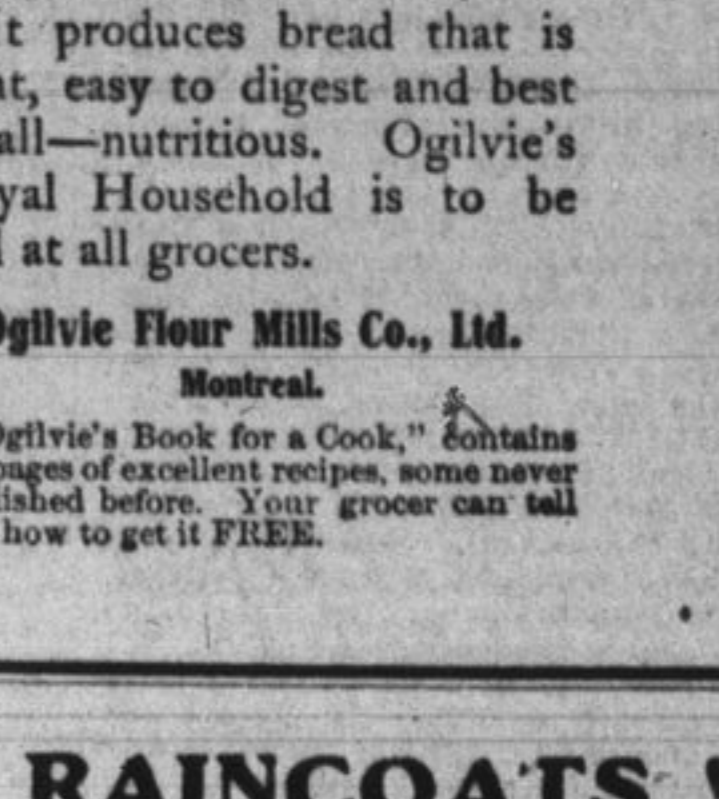
