SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

Any even numbered section of Domin-ion Lands in Mamitoba or the North-west Provinces, excepting 8 and 26, net reserved, may be homesteaded upon by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter sec-tion, of 160 acres more or less. homesteader desires, he may, on application to the Minister of the Interior, Ottawa, the Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, or the local agent for the district in which the land is situate receive authority for some one to make entry for him. HOMESTEAD DUTIES : A settler who stead is required to perform the con-ditions connected therewith under one of

ditions connected with the following when the following with m the following wlans:

(1) at least six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years.

(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of any person who is eligible to make a homestend entry under the provisions of this Act, resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for by such person as a homestend, the requirements of this Act as to residence prior to obtaining patent may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

(8) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his nomestend, the requirements of this Act as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.

APPLICATION FOR PATENT should

be made at the end of three years, be-fore the Local Agent, Sub-Agent of the omestead Inspector. Before making applications for patent he settler must give six months' notice in writing to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa, of his intention YNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST MINING REGULATIONS.

Coal.—Coal lands may be purchased at \$10 per acre for soft coal and \$20 for anthracite. Not more than \$20 acres can be acquired by one individual or com. pany. Royalty at the rate of ten cents per ton of 2,000 pounds shall be collected on the gross output.

Quartz.—A free miner's certificate is granted upon payment in advance of \$5 per annum for an individual, and from \$50 to \$100 per annum for a company according to capital.

A free miner, having discovered mineral in place, may, locate a claim 1,500x1,-500 feet.

The fee for recording a claim is \$5.

At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year or paid to the mining recorder in lieu thereof, When \$500 has been expended or paid, the locator may, upon having a survey made, and upon complying with other requirements, purchase the land at \$1 an acre.

The patent provides for the payment of royalty of 2½ per cent on the sales.

A free miner may obtain two leases to redge for gold of five miles each for a orm of twenty years, renewable at the incretion of the Minister of the Interior. 


