



CZAR REWARDS A TRAITOR

Gives Silver Inkstand to Man Who Plotted Grandfather's Death-

Pardoned on Peaching. St. Petersburg, March 30.-Emperor Nicholas has presented a silver inkstand to Leo Tikhamiroff, who has just published a book in defense of the autocracy.

Tikhamirofi formerly was the idol of the revolutionists and a member of the executive committee of "The People's Will," which plotted the assassination of Emperor Alexander II., grandfather of the present czar. His successful escapes from the Russian secret police form a thrilling chapter in the revolutionary history of the

terrorist period. In 1887, Tikhamiroff renounced revolutionism and betraved his former comrades, in return for which he was pardoned. In recent years he has been a writer for the reactionary press.
