NOT IN SIGHT YET

RAILWAY MATTERS ARE FAR FROM SETTLEMENT.

Feeling That Worst is Passed—Militia Dismissed, to Be Regular at Call—Mayor Orders Regular Service—Ministerial Association Tries Peace-Making.

Winnipeg, April 2.—No settlement is in sight, and matters are still critical in the street railway strike. No acts of violence were to be seen on the streets, on Sunday, and there is a feeling of hopefulness that the worst is passed, and that an amicable settlement may be effected to-day.

The militia were dismissed, yesterday afternoon, with orders to hold themselves in readiness for instant call. A large number of special constables have been sworn in by the mayor.

The ministerial association had conferences with both the men and the company. Both parties have decided to hold private meetings to deliberate their position, though no definite promises to compromise have been made by the directors.

On their part, however, the men have offered to waive recognition of the union, if an acceptable increase in wages is granted.

Mayor Sharpe has demanded that the regular car service be maintained, and in accordance with this the company started nearly this morning, but so far, have not carried any passengers.
