DEPENDS ON RESULT

ACTION OF THE EMBALMING FLUID ON CORPSES.

Patrick, Condemned for Murder, Pleaded With Other Condemned Men to Lend Their Bodies to Experiment.

New York, March 31.—Four years after the date on which he was convicted of the murder of William Marsh Rice, the Texas millionaire, Albert T. Patrick's plea that an actual test be made to prove or disprove his contention that embalming fluid and not chloroform was the cause of the condition of Rice's body was granted yesterday. It was the office of District Attorney Jerome, and not the defense of Patrick, however, which has undertaken the investigation, which Patrick has earnestly requested.

Several times during the years in which Patrick has fought his case with legal moves directed from the jail, the convicted man has begged of condemned prisoners to allow his corpse to experiment on their bodies after death in order to disprove that Rice died from the application of chloroform, as Valet Jones testified, and to prove Patrick's allegation that Rice died of general debility. It was Patrick's contention that the embalming fluid administered after Rice's death produced, and would produce in another case, conditions such as physicians who testified in the case described to chloroform poisoning.

Despite his efforts, however, the condemned man has been unable to bring about the experiments. It was announced from District Attorney Jerome's office today that the experiments to test Patrick's theory were begun today under the direction of that office. Two persons whose bodies are to be used either in giving Patrick his liberty or defeating his efforts to secure a new trial are patients who died in the Metropolitan hospital a few days ago, and the disposition of whose bodies was under the control of Dr. Louis S. Schultz, of the charities department of the city, who assigned them to that use. They were Luigi Carabottic, aged fifty-six years, and Rachel Williams, a colored woman, who was seventy years old at her death. One was older and the other younger than Rice. Their bodies will be embalmed with the same sort of fluid which was used in Rice's case. After a suitable time has elapsed they will be autopsied. Experiments along this line in the Patrick case have hitherto been made, but not on human subjects. Patrick is now in Sing Sing Prison awaiting execution, or a new trial under a reprieve recently granted by the governor.

USE OF WATER METERS

Results in Large Saving in Drink in Brookline.

The metal water meter system was introduced in Brookline, Mass., between June 15th, and December 15th, last year. According to a recent report submitted by the water commissioners and their assistants, the saving was only was there a large saving made in the consumption of water, but the date has been postponed, when an additional supply will be necessary. During December the decrease below the previous December of water pumped was 21.5 per cent, and the saving is largely attributed to the introduction of the meter system. About sixty per cent of the new meter takers paid less than formerly under the fixture rates and of the remaining forty per cent, few exceeded their previous fixture rates. About 100 new supplies were added to the system, but the total amount of water consumed was 13.5 per cent, less than the preceding year's corresponding period.

BIBLE IN 360 LANGUAGES.

Latest Translation Gives Scriptures to Guam.

Chicago Chronicle.

When a translation of the Bible which Rev. F. H. Price, a missionary in Guam, is now working on, shall have been completed the scriptures, in 360 different languages. Hitherto the number has been 259.

The language of the natives of Guam is called Chamorro. It is one of the most difficult of the South Sea dialects, which have always proved difficult for the white man's tongue. By assiduous labor Rev. Mr. Price mastered it sufficiently to undertake the translation, so that the scriptures may read the Bible in their own language. He is translating only portions of scripture.

When it is taken into account that few persons can read the scriptures, it is not surprising that the Bible has been translated into 360 is evidence of the wide scope of missionary work. These forerunners of Christianity have penetrated into every corner of the globe, and the Bible societies follow them closely.

It is estimated by members of the American Bible Society, which will publish Mr. Price's translation in Chamorro, that more than 1,000,000 copies of the Bible were printed and circulated during 1906.

From the invention of printing the Bible has been "the best selling book."

Old Damascus.

There, too, and like wise within the walls, one sees the lines of indolent eastern women drawing water from the well, just as Rachel did; or women sitting before the doors of their houses grinding corn in the old Bar way, with upper and nether stones.

Liquor Conviction Concluded—Veterinary in Trouble.

The conviction of Dr. Shaw of Lansdowne, for violation of the liquor law, has been cancelled on account of the summons being unsigned. If any thing further is done in the matter new information will have to be taken, a new summons issued, and a new hearing given before the magistrate.

BRITISH HEROES DIE.

One Fought Through Sepoy Mutiny; Another at Balakava.

London, April 3.—British army men are mourning the death of three officers whose names are familiar all over the empire, and who, by a strange coincidence, expired almost simultaneously. They are Surgeon-General John Lumsdaine, Maj.-Gen. Alexander Clark-Kennedy and Maj.-Gen. James de Havilland.

Surgeon-General Lumsdaine served in a score of battles during the Sepoy mutiny. He retired in 1852.

Gen. Clark-Kennedy entered the Indian army in 1842, and retired after thirty-eight years' service, with the rank of major-general. He served with distinction in the Egyptian war of 1882, with the Burma expedition of 1887-88, and with the Chin-Lushat expeditionary force in 1889-90.

Gen. de Havilland took part in the battles of the Alma and Balakava in the Crimean war. He received the Crimean medal with three clasps, for the Alma, Balakava, Sevastopol, the Turkish medal and a brevet majority. He retired with the honorary rank of major-general in 1880.
