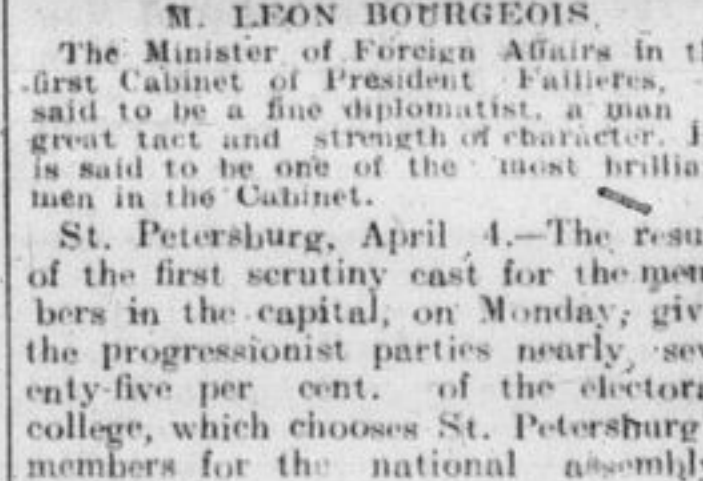

The Ontario government has decided to sell the postpaid bond Gilpin, now at Collingwood.

The Moscow police have confiscated a pamphlet written by Count Tolstol, entitled, 'Is It Possible?'

Mrs. Mary A. Cooper, London, the original of Dickens' 'Little Dorrit,' is well and strong at ninety years.

Andrew Brown, brother of the manager of the quarry, Philipburg, Que., was crushed to death between cars.

The Spanish authorities claim the recent Carlist movement has been stamped out. Quantities of rifles have been seized.

A plucky New York policeman saved a woman from death in a tenement fire, and then fainted from the pain of his loss.

Nothing was accomplished at the conference of anthracite coal men in New York and an adjournment was made until Thursday.

The British government decided that it would be a diplomatic impropriety to discuss in the house of parliament the persecution of the Jews in Russia.

L. A. Gendron, ex-M.P. for Ottawa county, to-day, entered suit against Mr. John M.P. from the East at Quebec, for \$5,000 for an alleged libelous statement.

A. W. Puitce, ex-M.P. for Winnipeg, was struck by an automobile. He was thrown in the air, and died unconscious. He is suffering from concussion of the brain.

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MISS J. SMITH ACQUITTED. Was Accused of Stealing a Prayer Book.

Prayer Book. Cornwall, Ont., April 4.—At the spring assizes before Justice G. J. Smith, Miss Josephine Smith, Ottawa, formerly of Morrisville, was acquitted of a charge of retaining and diverting to her own use a Roman Catholic prayer book, printed in Paris, France, in 1806, and believed to have been at one time the property of Mary Queen of Scots.

Miss Smith is a well-known antiquarian. The book was entrusted to her in December, 1901, and committed for trial by Mr. Farlinger and Mr. McDonald, two Morrisburg justices of the peace. At the January assizes, Justice Anglin presiding, the case was sent over to the court to give Miss Smith a chance to return the book. She has since been out on bail. Yesterday she conducted her own case, and addressed the jury. She also testified that she believed the book to be among some goods sent to a friend in Philadelphia, which are still in possession of the express company. She denied any intention of retaining the book, and the jury evidently believed her.

SAVED HIS LIFE. And is Now Given a Humane Testimonial.

Toronto, April 4.—Master Oliver Sherburne, thirteen years of age, is the happy recipient of the Royal Canadian Humane Association's honorary testimonial for promptitude and courage in rescuing his schoolmate, Frederick Black, eleven years of age, from drowning in Toronto Bay, on February 15th last. H. P. Dwight, chairman of the investigating committee, made the presentation. Young Black was walking on this ice covering deep water near the Queen's wharf, when the ice gave way, and he fell into the water. Young Sherburne, who was near by, went to his assistance and pulled him out. Again the ice broke and Black was precipitated into the water a second time and a second time was rescued by Sherburne and fortunately this time he was brought safely to shore.

NOT AFRAID OF TEMPEST. Alfonso Continues His Triumphant Tour.

Las Palmas, C.T., April 3.—A continuous gale and high seas prompted Admiral Conas, minister of marine, and other members of King Alfonso's court, to try to disengage the monarch from completing his tour of the islands. The King, who does not suffer from sea sickness, laughed at them and insisted upon seeing all the islands and meeting all the islanders personally. He will sail hence at midnight for Santa Cruz. His suite seems to be apprehensive of an incident. Scenes of enthusiastic loyalty, similar to those witnessed in Tenerife, were re-enacted here. The king welcomed everybody by his good nature and pleasant manner.

Guests of President. Washington, April 4.—President Roosevelt gave a dinner at the White House last night in honor of the governor-general of Canada and Countess Grey and their party. The visitors arrived from New York and went direct to the White House, where they were over night guests of the president. They will remain in the city for several days, and will be entertained by the British ambassador and Lady Durand and other friends.

Champion Walker Dead. Chicago, April 4.—Napoleon Campana, known throughout the country as 'Old Sport' Campana, died Tuesday, of heart disease and dropsy, in a hospital here. Twenty-five years ago Campana was a professional pedestrian taking part in many walking matches in all parts of the United States. He was seventy-five years old.

Canada Cup Boat Sold. Hamilton, Ont., April 4.—The Canada cup boat Naniwa has been sold by John H. Fearnside, the builder, to J. G. Gayer, of the Columbia Yacht Club, Chicago. Mr. Fearnside will at once build a twenty-one footer to compete in the Lipton cup race at Chicago in August. It will be from a design by a New York man.

\$50,000 Recovered. New York, April 4.—About \$50,000 worth of securities alleged to have been stolen by Thomas J. Wainwright from the residence of Dr. Nicholas Senn, in Minneapolis, were found in a safe deposit vault in a bank in this city. Wainwright is accused of having stolen \$100,000 of silverware, plate and securities.
