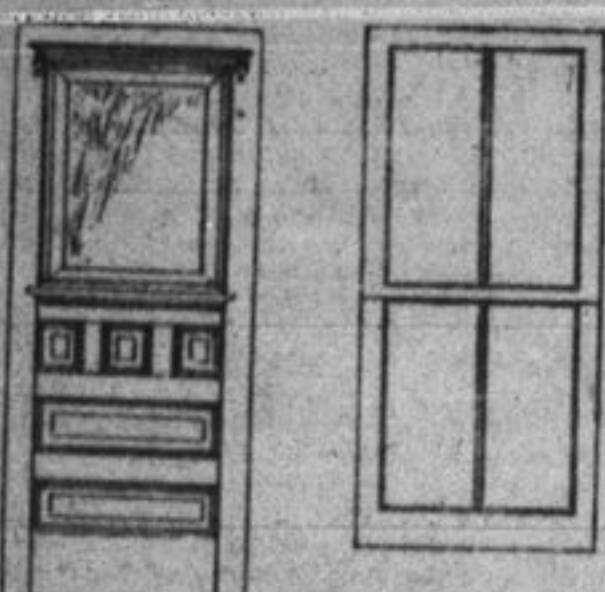

Appeals To The People.

The Private Bills' Committee of the Ontario legislature the other day discussed the willingness of the banks to loan funds to municipalities when the latter did not possess the right to borrow. The suggestion was made that the next time the legislature was asked to validate a debt of this kind it should refuse, the feeling being that one refusal would mean an end of such borrowing. "There is no doubt that it would," says the Montreal Gazette, "and that such a condition of affairs would lead to more conservative financing on the part of the municipalities. Nowadays, instead of appealing to the ratpayers the councils go to the legislature and ask it for the sanction the ratpayers are intended by law to give. The legislature should serve notice upon the banks that they will make unauthorized loans to municipalities at their own risk."

The legislature should go further and refuse the municipalities the power to do any extreme act, or act affecting the taxes, when there has been no appeal to the people. The court has been quoted as giving a decision that under certain conditions the people should not or need not be consulted. The legislature should make it clear that this is not its idea of the eternal fitness of things.

No Defense Is Offered.

The senate committee of the State of New York, at Albany, has a bill before the house which should be killed. It is in essence that the railway companies be required to provide passes to state officers, when out on public duty, on the certificate of the secretary of state.

Why should a railway company be asked to carry any one as a "dead head," on public business? The large revenue of the railways is from passenger rates, and when the state sends out any official on public business it can well afford to pay his way.

The implication is that there must be a quid pro quo. What do the railway companies get out of it? Any return? They are going to the legislature and the senate continually on business, in behalf of acts of a very important character. Can the men who order the companies to issue passes, not only to the legislators, but to the public officials afford to be very stiff and independent?

Wealth Of Gillies Limit.

Gadgets, whose facile pen jots down the very interesting savings of The Clock in the Ontario legislature, hints very clearly that the government may go into mining on its own account in the cobalt district.

Mr. Whitney is pictured as looking big with this new idea which he has nurtured almost to the bursting point. The Gillies limit is at the disposal of the administration. It has been walked over by many experts, some as prospectors, and the genuine opinion is that of all the rich spots in this new country none is to compare with that of which the government has the control.

There are millions in it, and, says The Clock, "the plan of working" it to enrich the whole people instead of using it to make a new group of millionaires commends itself as a great public service." It is more than this, "it is a bold stroke of policy on the part of the government."

There is something enticing in the thought of public ownership. There are some people who will applaud it, and clamour for the commission under whose direction the silver and cobalt will be chopped out of the veins in huge blocks and become such an asset for the province that all other sources of revenue will dwarf into insignificance.

Public ownership is all right if it can be demonstrated that the people's representatives will act in all cases with the care and economy of the private owner or syndicate. A good deal depends on the men who compose the commission and the powers which they are given.

The revenue from customs in Canada last year was \$41,000,000, or double what it was ten years ago. The trade of the year amounted to half a billion of dollars. Canada is growing in every way. One cannot conjecture what it will be ten years hence,

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Taking The Right Course.

A deputation of county men went to Toronto on Tuesday on public business. They wish to see Mr. Campbell, the deputy commissioner of public works, and talk over with him the question of good roads.

The roads in the county are not good—that is as good as they should be—and they never will be any better until they become county property and are put under the control and direction of the county council. Stock companies spend as much as they can on the roads which belong to them, but there is a limit to their outlay when they make some allowance for the investment.

The county's idea, which is the correct one, is that good roads contribute to trade, that trade leads to settlement and service. Thus all around and in every direction the work leads to the best results.

At the last meeting of the county council this subject came up for consideration. Some of the commissioners wrestled with the issue most sincerely. Plans were developed, looking to the acquisition of the tolled roads and the maintenance of them under the county's jurisdiction. The best laid schemes, however, failed to evolve as they were expected. In them all there was some difficulty it was found impossible to surmount.

There was an honest desire for action, however, and it was stimulated by the decision to hold the good roads' convention in this county this year. To signalize the event by a solution of the good roads' problem in Frontenac impelled the proceeding which is now reported.

The commissioner of good roads, an expert, a man of large experience and ready resource, will be asked to suggest a method by which the county council may reach a definite conclusion at the June session. Good luck to the project is the only and most sincere wish of the Whig.

Employment Of An Expert.

The Whig likes the proposal of a consultative council with regard to the gas and electric extensions. The department will be the better of a report upon which the best thought has been brought to bear. Current or public opinion calls for a scheme which is the best conceivable.

The position is not defensible that a report, for council uses, need not be perfected, that it will be sufficient to submit something approximately right and refer it to the people. The council is in duty bound to produce the most acceptable plan of procedure, keeping in mind the two great essentials, namely, economy of cost and efficiency of operation.

When the decters have had before them the actual requirements of the light, heat and power department, with the certificates of men of reputation, there will be the greater reason to expect a favorable response. The demand of the hour, truly, is for the proposal which will at once command the public confidence.

Meanwhile there is only one reference in the report which calls for comment. It is that which suggests the possibility of an arrangement by which the surplus power from the generators of the street railway may be utilized. The agreement of last year with the street railway has been passed by the council of this year, and by the legislature, with somewhat of a strain. The discussion on it has been closed. It is not necessary that it should be reopened.

The carrying out of the arrangement, existing between the city and the company calls for no new relationship, however attractively it may be presented. On the contrary, the clearer the line of division in their interests the better a good many people will be pleased.

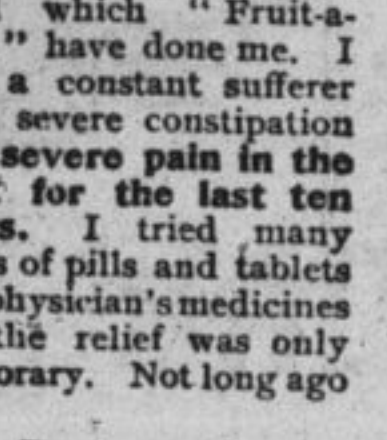
