He wounded a young woman named Henri as she was taking a child to school, and several other persons were hit. It was decided to arrest Brancourt, and the gendarmes arrived a man hunt was organized. Brancourt was forced into a wood. Realizing that he would ultimately be captured he blew out his brains. He had fired eighteen cartridges before taking his life.

**The Press And Trade.**

A business man of the city, who is a keen observer, tells the Whig that much of the business that was formerly done in the towns and villages in the east is now going to Toronto.

The big houses have developed a mail and money order connection of the largest kind. The people like it. They see something advertised which they want, at a certain price, and they write for it, and enclose a postal note or post-office order in payment of the same.

There is nothing exclusive about the practice. There is no patent on this way of cultivating trade. Any live druggist can create a run upon his goods if he advertises it and puts a quotation on it which is alluring.

The Toronto man offers a certain article at a certain figure, but he does it in such a manner that the bargain side of the case becomes apparent. The Kingston man has the same article, or as good, and he can sell it as cheap. Why does he not challenge attention? Why does not advertise in the right way?

"Oh," but it may be said, "The Whig is saying this because it is interested in the result." To some extent it is. It is interested, however, in the business of the city generally, and it contends that any storeman, with the right goods for sale at the right prices, can make a sale at any time by advertising.

Moreover, no merchant, in Montreal or Toronto, has a monopoly of the patronage by mail. The people of the day are a reading people, and they are a buying people, and the motive of their action and the result are connected by the part the press plays in their enlightenment.

**A Game Of Bluff.**

The knowing ones, all conservatives of course, and imitators of the premier in his mysterious airs, are sure Mr. Matheson or Mr. Hanna has something up his sleeve, and that some of these days the members of the opposition will be sorry they spoke.

If anyone supposes that the liberals in the legislature will scare before such talk they will be much mistaken. Mr. Whitney leads in the insinuations by asking of the loan arrangement, "What is the consideration? Does he suspect any wrong-doing? Dare he express it?"

The talk that there are bigger scandals in reserve, and that they will be stirring some of these days, will not deter any legislator from the performance of his duty. Generally, says the Toronto News, the gossip is false, and malicious, and the government is in large business when it threatens to make exposure if the liberals do not keep very quiet.

The News takes no stock in the "bluff." It has had an example of its worth in the case of the license inspectors respecting whom, it was alleged, there were things the publicity of which would create a furore. Our contemporary adds:

"If there are scandals to be exposed in the legislature which affect important public interests, let the ministers give the facts to the province without delay. If not, let us have done with the suggestion that if Mr. Harcourt and other ex-ministers will be indulgent to the facts of liberal misgovernment which exist in the departments will not be discovered to the people."

Well spoken. Timely advice. It makes one tired to hear supposedly great men talk in veiled language, concealingly, and with the aim of those who are hurting themselves while they keep some secrets.

**A Cabinet Of Wonders.**

The government has made its announcement respecting the Gilles limit, which has been eyed enviously by prospectors and the clamour for which in October, when the timber will be removed, was expected to be very great. The limit lies south of Cobalt, and the area of three and a half miles is believed to hold veins of silver and cobalt of incalculable value.

The extent of the wealth is not appreciable, but it is expected to yield a very handsome revenue to the government, possibly from one to two millions a year and for several years. In addition large results are anticipated for the mining of the right of way of the Temiscaming railway near Cobalt. This strip is about a hundred feet wide and three and a half miles long. The government will expect tenders for the privilege of mining this, but it has set a minimum condition of \$50,000 in cash, and a royalty running from 10 to 50 per cent, according to the value of the ore which is taken out.

The Mail announces this declaration of public ownership and bounty as "one

splendid stroke of statesmanship." For some time there have been agitation respecting the possession of the mining lands, and all sorts of conjectures as to the manner in which the government would divide or distribute them. The decision to mine in behalf of the province, by a commission, is not such a surprise. It has been talked of for days, and as the only safe course which the government dare pursue in order to be saved "from the claim staker or the grafter."

The "identifying announcement" is very gratifying, of course, especially that concerning the Temiscaming railway the whole cost of which, it is estimated, will be covered by the product of the mines. Remembering that the railway was the projection of the liberals, that it was opposed by the opposition, that it led to the mineral discoveries, "the richest on the face of the earth," the marvel is that the government of "statesmen" could sell provincial bonds at a discount and seek the public applause.

**Editorial Notes.**

Oh, no, Mr. Borden. The federal government is not going to let want of confidence resolutions in disguise pass the house. There is only one safe for them.

The legislature has been emphasizing one great, plain truth—that when the people's pockets are affected by any municipal legislation the people must be consulted.

Mr. Ingrassia and Mr. Verville are the only genuine independents in the commons, and neither has spoken or voted yet against the sessional indemnity of \$2,500.

Hon. Mr. Hanna, discussing the "Benson question, referred to some officials whose retention of place depended on whether they behaved themselves. Now isn't that very burlesque talk!

London, on July 1st, 1906, will lower the cost of gas from \$1 per 1,000 feet to 95c. At the end of five years there will be another drop of 5c, per 1,000 feet. What kind of machinery is the company using?

Ottawa is in somewhat of a muddle over its electric plant. It is not quite decided as to how it should be managed—by a committee or a commission. It will try the one, and if it does not work will seek the other.

Mr. Carscallen, M.P.P., a lawyer, has a bill in hand which prevents anyone doing conveyancing except members of the legal profession. The lay members of the legislature should be equal to the slaughtering of that measure.

R.A. Ross, desired as an expert on our gas and electric plants, is certainly a good man. In the arbitration respecting these plants he was referred to as "the saviour of the city." May he prove true to this reputation.

Mr. McNaught, M.P.P., resigned as a license commissioner in Toronto, because he disapproved of the dismissal of the inspectors. Now he is understood to say that the government made a mistake in not dismissing the officials before. What changed his mind?

The bituminous coal men's strike will soon be over. The fact that some of the larger colliers are now paying the higher wage will presently compel a general surrender of all. The anthracite men are up against it. They are teaching the great lesson—that the fuel fields must yet belong to the people.

**LOST FOR YEARS**

**A CHILD IS RESTORED TO HER MOTHER.**

Recollections of 14-Year-Old Girl Revived by Visit to Scenes of Her Babyhood—The Mystery Solved.

Belfast, Ireland, April 5.—A nine-year-old mystery has been partially solved at County Down, Ireland, in a somewhat dramatic manner.

Nine years ago a little girl named Susan Kerr, about four years of age, disappeared from her parents' home at Ballynahinch. A diligent search proved fruitless. Her father died, and her mother, marrying again, removed to Belfast.

The other day a girl of fourteen went to Ballynahinch to obtain some hem-stitching for her employer, a farmer in the neighborhood. After making her purchase she walked through the town. Certain places appeared to have stirred her memory, for, after taking back her purchases to the shop, the girl went to several houses endeavoring to induce the occupants to take her in.

Eventually she was successful, and in telling the story of her parentage she called to recollection the disappearance of Susan Kerr.

Mrs. Kerr was communicated with, and she proceeded to Ballynahinch. She had no difficulty in recognizing her lost daughter, whom she took home with her.

The girl has little recollection of what befell her before she was employed with the farmer in the neighborhood of Ballynahinch, though it is believed that she resided in Belfast and Downpatrick.

**A Sudden Death.**

Dundas, Ont., April 5.—John Bertram, the veteran manufacturer, and head of the great Bertram works in Dundas, died suddenly on Wednesday, aged seventy-seven. He was going to his office and after getting ready went upstairs. His daughter, Mrs. (Dr.) Stirling thought she heard him fall. She ran up and found him dead. Mr. Bertram was a native of Edlestone, Peebleshire, Scotland. He was a member of the Dundas Presbyterian church.

He leaves a family which consists of Henry Bertram, now president of the company, Lieut. Col. Alexander Bertram, Dr. Thomas Bertram, and James B. Bertram, also in the business, and one daughter, Mrs. (Dr.) Stirling.
