ing the baggage of the expedition. Leaving Lake Victoria, the expedition will cross that part of Uganda which lies between the lake and the outlying spurs of Ruwenzori. This is expected to take fifteen days. As this region is under the British protectorate it is not expected that the expedition will meet with any difficulties. He will take with him a numper of the newest scientific instruments which have been tested in the meteorological observatory here. It is stated that only one man, a German member of the Alpine Club, has ever succeeded in reaching the top of Ruwenzori.
