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

SOME INSTANCES OF CURI-OUS ANIMAL FRIENDSHIPS.

High Development of Maternal Animal Orders-Many stances of Wolf-Children India-Mowgli Founded

The subject of foster-parentage among the lower animals is always interesting, and rarely does a season pass without furnishing some new instances of the high developments of the material instinct among the members of the humbler animal orders. opportunity of displaying anything of The past year has been prolific of examples, some of which have been particularly curious by reason of the wide diversity between the foster-parent, and the adopted child or children.

Early in the past summer a female collie at Thornton Marishes, near Pickering, gave birth to a litter of pups, all of which died. A few days afterwards the collie brought home in its mouth a very young rabbit, and settled down to mother it. No more quaint animal picture

could be imagined than that of the sleeping dog, which under ordinary circumstances would bunt the furry tribe with the greatest zest, yet to its adopted child showed the utmost care

But perhaps an even more extraorfor settlement, without delay, and rying off to keep an appointment, was the adopted child, occurred in the spring at Garstang, in Lancashire, where the foster-parent was a female

A lad who kept a pair of ferrets found a nest of four young rabbits, which he took home and gave to his pets. The little birds were in the habit of nest ling under the soft for of their foster mother just as though she were hen, and though they would spend hours clambering over the cat's body, she never once lost patience with

At midsummer a case occurred at Penzance where the position was reversed, the foster-mother being a bantam hen, whose eggs had been taken Away, and the children, a litter of kittens, which were born in the loft where the bantam roosted.

The fowl resented every approach of the cat to her offspring with true bantam spirit, and the real mother was compelled to look on from a safe place at the sight of the fowl spread ing her wings over the nestling kit tens just as though they were her own chicks. The kittens could only approach their mother to obtain the ndcessary nourishment, when the bantam had been forcibly removed.

Pigeons' eggs are often hatched by hen chickens, but it is not a commor occurrence for rigeons to hatch out a brood of chickens. Such a case occurred near Tunbridge Wells last August where a pair of pigeons hatched thre pairs of chicks.


