

FOLLOW UP SYSTEM.

Useful in Getting After Church Delinquents.

Church finances have often been a source of worriment to members who are responsible for their successful outcome. But to-day it is found that the only way to reach the delinquents is by the adoption of modern business methods. There is really as much need and more reason for systematized work in the business of the church as in any other kind of business. To rely on an appeal from the pulpit to bring in the tithes is not only unsuccessful, but quita distasteful as well.

Where a judicious use of the followup system has been installed, a remarkable benefit has been received. The official board of the Nostrand M. E. church of Brooklyn, New York, sent out this spring to all its members convincing little booklet entitled "According to Your Ability." By argument and illustration it laid before each seember the need of systematic giving. It appealed to them not as alms-givers, but as business men.

Many instances might be cited notable returns received from such a follow-up system. One church in the suburb of Chicago had every year great difficulty in keeping itself out of debt. But one year the pastor, Rev. C. A. Kelley, resolved to carry on the finances in a more systematic form. The appeal was made by booklet and letter through the mail and the notincement from the pulpit was mere ly in emphasis of the individual let ters. The record of each member's account was kept publicly in the vestibule of the church and checked off by the treasurer each week, The result is 230 individuals are turning in their regular contributions.

He is not kept awake by pangs | house that a house can't hold, one has that we can. The android walks, rides a bicycle, and writes its own name like a creature of flesh and blood. The inventor of the new citizen is Herr Frederick Ireland, and the construction of the automaton is extremely interesting. The figure, which is named Enigmarrelle, is about five feet, seven inches tall, weighs 198 pounds, and is composed of 305 different pieces; the feet are of iron, the lower limbs of steel and wood, and the arms steel and copper. There are no less thus seven motors in the figure, these being in part driven by springs and in part by electricity, while the two strongest motors move the lower mem bers and thus cause the forward movi ment. There are forty accumulators eighty-four volts, delivering 2,700 am peres an hour, which provide the power for the motors, and at the same time serve to maintain the balance." To as great an extent as is possible in automatic contrivances, Herr Irelano has copied the internal mechanism of the human body, For example in man the equilibrium is maintained by the metion of liquids in the semicircular canals of the car. We are conscious of our position by the nerves of these canals communicating to the brain the position of the enclosed liquid. In like manner, quicksilver is used in the automaton, and the making and breaking of an electrie current by the motions of this metal resulting from the motion of the figure preserve the balance. As the German paper says "One motion pushes first the left log forward, the figure in consequence

> serves as a conductor of the current, comes in contact with a connection which places a motor in movement that in turn establishes the balance again. The right foot is then advanced and the same thing occurs, the figure thus moving forward step step. The other movements are


