EXPOSE GANG

Who Robbed McKay's Fur Store.

A MAN SQUEALED

THE GANG CAME TO ROB THOMAS MILLS.

Chief Carpenter Has in Custody Man Who Tells of Plans for Extensive Robberies—William Feldman the Leader.

Through the arrest of George Parker, plumber, St. Felix street, who was caught on Wednesday by Detectives D. A. McLaughlin and Viens, and is held to answer to several charges of burglary, Chief Detective Carpenter has learned of a conspiracy hatched in Montreal to commit a series of burglaries here and throughout the country.

Schacher Enquete Fixed. Charles Schacher was before Judge Lafontaine, on Saturday, On Friday Judge Lafontaine held him in bonds of \$3,000 to appear in Kingston, Thursday, but James Cranshaw, who has been retained to defend Schacher, held that he should be given a hearing here before he was sent to Kingston.

Chief Carpenter said last night that the name of the third man under arrest could not be made public for the present, as it is he who has furnished the information that led to the arrest of Schacher. He will be used as a witness for the prosecution against Feldman and Schacher.

The chief detective has learned that while Feldman was in jail here last summer, he made a prisoner who knew of a process by which oxy-hydrogen would soften steel so that it could be easily bored.

When they reached Kingston they found that it would not be safe to "crack" the jewelry store, so Feldman decided that they would rob the establishment of Thomas Mills, a place that he had looted once before.

They took \$6,000 worth of furs from McKay's, and brought them to Montreal in grips and bundles rolled in oil cloth, and left them in Schacher's home at 161 St. Dominique street.

When the gang returned from Kingston, according to the story told by Chief Carpenter, they held a consultation to consider the best method of safe breaking, with the result that they decided to try electricity.

Shortly after this Feldman was arrested for the robbery of McKay's place in Kingston. When the gang left the store after committing the robbery they left a "jimmy" behind them. This was the clue that led to Feldman's arrest. The "jimmy" was sent here to Chief Carpenter, and one of his men found that it was made in Crowe's, St. George street, and in the employes of the shop recognized Feldman as the man who had given the order and paid \$1.25 for the tool.
