SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS

west Provinces, excepting 8 and 26, net reserved, may be homesteaded upon by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any mais over 18 years of

homesteader desires, he may, on application to the Minister of the Interior, Ottawa, the Commissioner of Imrigration, Winnipeg, or the local agent for the district in which the land is situ-ate receive authority for some one to make entry for him. HOMESTEAD DUTIES : A settler who has been granted an entry for a home-stead is required to perferm the con-ditions connected therewith under one of the following plans;
(1) at least six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years.

(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of any person who is eligible to make a homestead entry under the provisions of this Act, resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for by such person as a home-tead, the requirements of this Act as to residence prior to obtaining patent may satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by im in the vicinity of bis nomestead, the requirements of this Act as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the APPLICATION FOR PATENT should

he settler must give six months' notice in writing to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa, of his intention YNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST MINING REGULATIONS.
