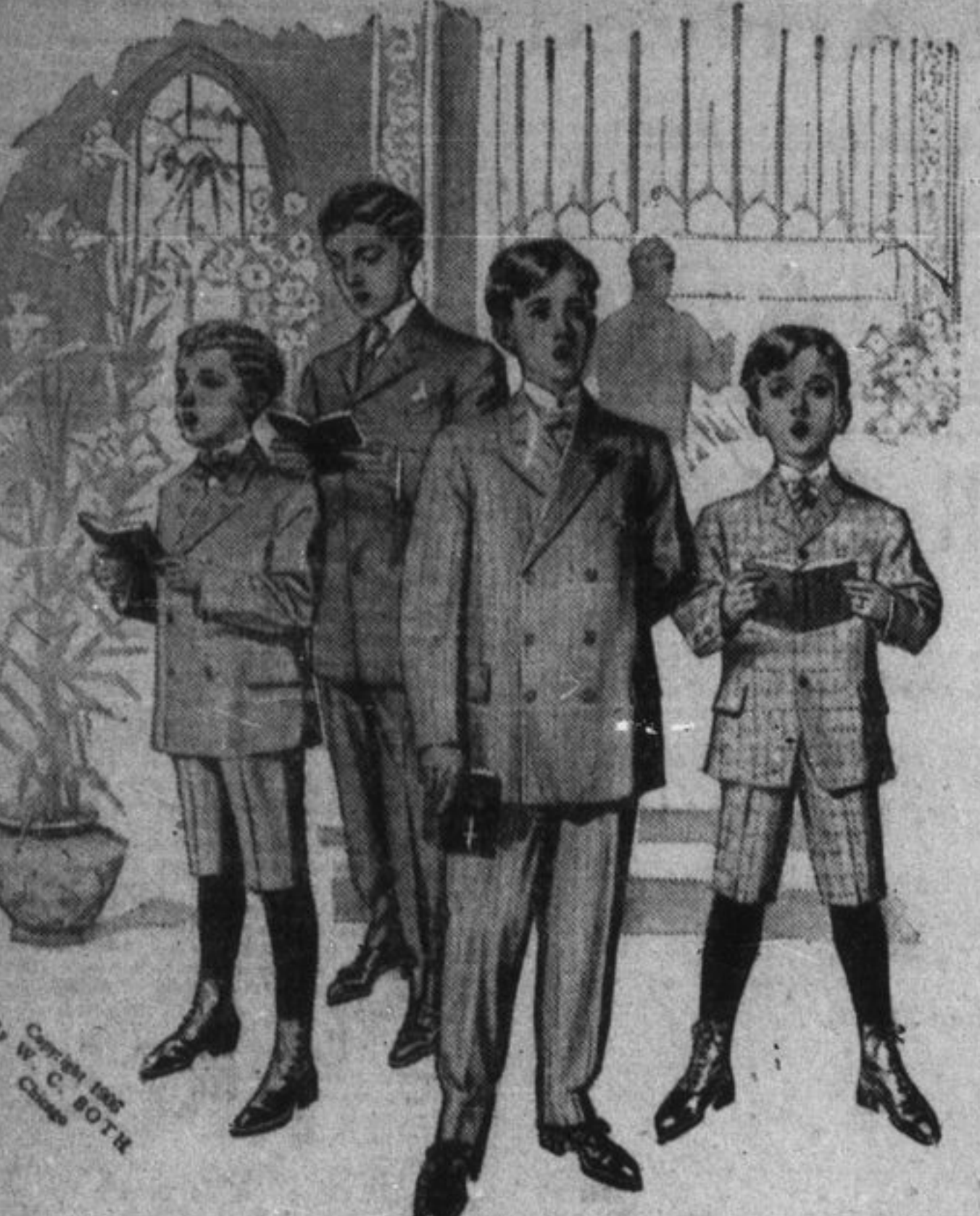

COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

What Is Going On In the Business World—The Markets.

The Dominion Coal output for March was 310,000 tons, compared with 228,765 tons last year.

Trade of the United States with Canada in the fiscal year 1905 aggregated \$202,999,213, against \$29,429,094 in 1904.

It is stated that there are about 225,000 miles of cable in all at the bottom of the sea. Each mile costs about £200 to lay.

There are now under way 13,014 miles of new railroads in the United States, and there are live projects for 8,423 miles.

The recent issue of the town of Pembroke debentures, amounting to \$18,352,47, has been awarded to Canadian Securities, Limited, the highest tender.

The total potato crop of Annapolis County, Maine, is estimated by a correspondent of Country Gentleman at 8,000,000 bushels, of which 6,000,000 bushels have already been marketed.

There are 8,000 horses or over on the payroll of the Dominion Coal Company, alone. Ten years ago the number was 9,000.

For every 2,200 lbs. of potatoes there are 100 bushels made by the Case-Bretton County collection—Miner's Record.

In 1905, the number of horses in Denmark was 1,108,000. By 1908 (the number had increased to 1,467,000. It is expected there has been a reduction since 1903, owing to severe plagues, but the figures are not available. The number of horses in Ontario in 1904 was 240,000, but the number is less now than then.

ATTACKED BY PIRATES.

Chinese Held Up Three Passenger Boats.

Hong Kong, April 9.—Chinese pirates on April 3rd, held up three passenger boats, fourteen miles from San Shui, not far from Canton, and robbed the Rev. Dr. Charles B. Hager, an American missionary. In an interview Dr. Hager said:

"Our boat and two others were anchored off a village on the Tung river, when they were simultaneously attacked at night by forty pirates, armed with Mauser rifles. They fired at us and narrowly missed me. The boats were riddled with bullet holes. The boats were filled with my clothes, cash and surgical instruments. I have reported the matter to the American consul at Canton."

Dr. Hager and his wife, Mrs. Marie V. R. Hager, reside in Hone Kong. They are Congregationalists and under the orders of the American board of commissioners for foreign missions.

GAS ENTERED HOUSE.

Punctured Pipe in Brockville Street Nearly Killed Three.

Brockville, Ont., April 9.—Mrs. Edward Young and two daughters narrowly escaped death by asphyxiation on Friday night, when they awoke to find their house filled with gas. The gas was caused by a punctured pipe in the supply pipe being exposed, was punctured by a driver, allowing the gas to escape in large quantities, a portion of which found its way into the Young house.

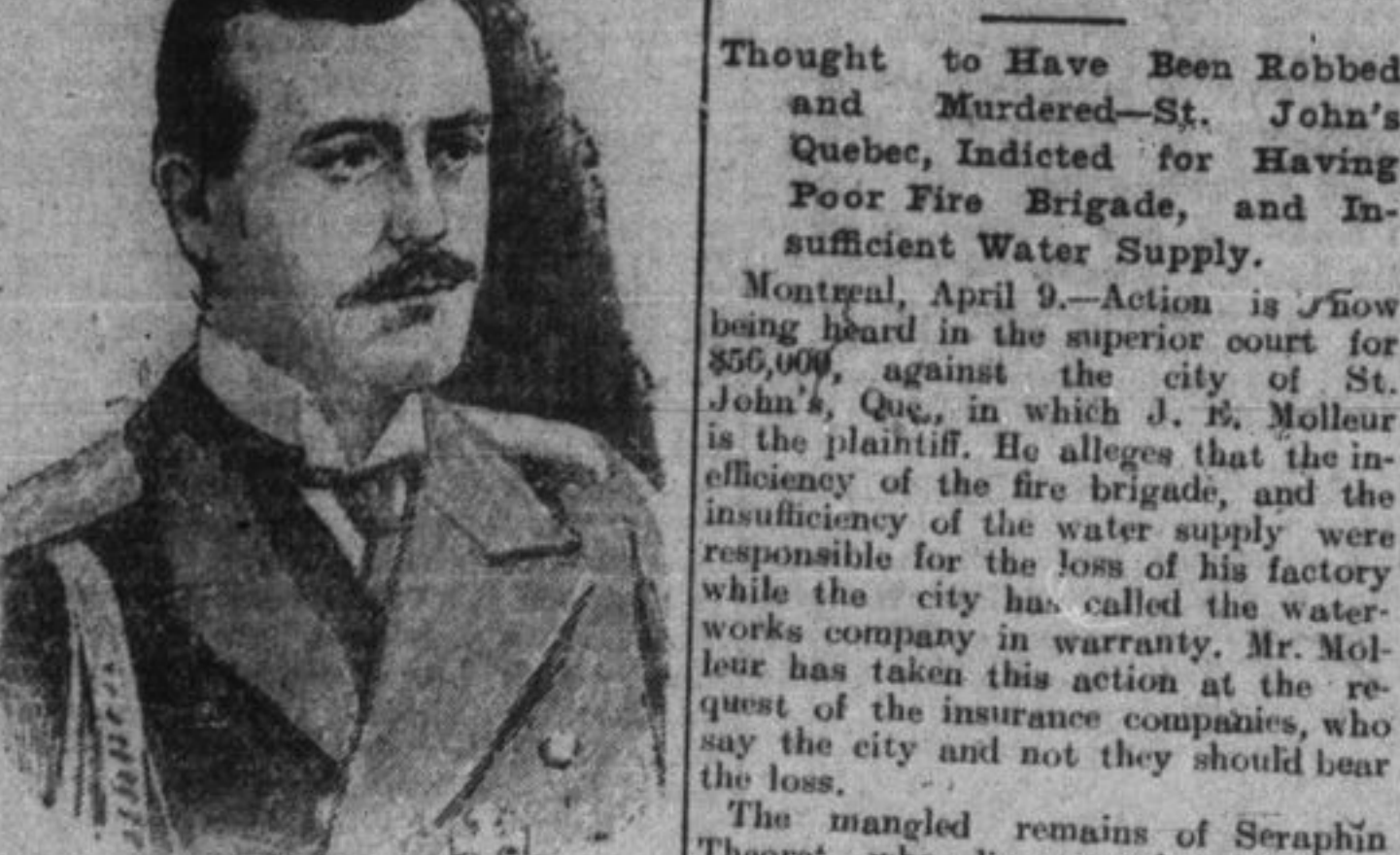

On Friday night she went in to see her brother, Dennis Brannigan, and was apparently quite well. On Saturday morning she complained of not feeling quite herself, and went to bed, pneumonia developed, and in barely more than twenty-four hours she was called to rest.

Miss Brannigan has been keeping house with her two sisters, Miss Susie and Miss Phoebe, at 229 Brock street, two married sisters, Mrs. J. J. Bevan and Mrs. John Walker, are also living in town, and another sister, Mrs. Patrick Hartly, in Ottawa. She was a faithful member of St. Mary's cathedral, and of the two societies, Sacred Heart, and the Children of Mary. Gentle, kind, unselfish, lovable, she leaves many grief-stricken relations. She was beloved of little children, and they, too, will miss her, as will a wide circle of friends.

Before he could get under he, meanwhile, clung to a cake of ice, reached him, when he was pulled out. He is around again to-day, apparently none the worse of his injury, which might have resulted in a severe sickness.

Veteran Printer Dead.

Harry M. Moody, for many years foreman of the Presbyterian printing office, Toronto, died on Saturday morning in Kingston General Hospital. Deceased was a member of the printing firm of Moody & Sons, Moore street, Birmingham, Eng., and was in his fifty-sixth year. Four daughters are left orphans. The remains were taken to Toronto.

MANGLED REMAINS

OF MAN FOUND IN THE LACHINE CANAL.

Thought to Have Been Robbed and Murdered—St. John's Quebec, Indicted for Having Poor Fire Brigade, and Insufficient Water Supply.

Montreal, April 9.—Action is now being heard in the superior court for \$50,000, against the city of St. John's, Que., in which J. F. Mollere is the plaintiff. He alleges that the inefficiency of the fire brigade, and the insufficiency of the water supply, were responsible for the loss of his factory while the city has called the water-works company in warranty. Mr. Mollere has taken this action at the request of the insurance companies, who say the city and not they should bear the loss.

The Mangled Remains of Scraphin Theoret, who disappeared in October last, were found in the Lachine canal, to-day. Theoret disappeared the night he had been paid by the Richelieu & Ontario Navigation company, \$25 in all. He had been drinking in a saloon and left for home, but the body was not seen of him alive. He had bruises on his head, but from what cause is unknown. It is believed he was robbed and his body thrown into the canal. The police are investigating.

THE FUR BURGLARS.

One of Them Stayed Here for Three Days Afterwards.

There is strong evidence against Feldman and his associates, for robbing the fur store of John McKay & Co. Whether the stolen goods will be recovered or not is another question, though there are hopes that a good part of them will be traced to the parties who bought them. The man to whom the goods were sold and who has left Montreal, may be secured, and through him the furs may be recovered.

The letter written by Feldman in the jail here last November, and which was carried out and mailed, will be brought as strong evidence against the old burglar. It was secured among the effects of Emmanuel, the man, who fled from Montreal. The letter was mailed unknown to the jail governor.

It has transpired that one of the men implicated in the robbery, and who is held, remained at the British-American hotel for three days after his pals cleared the Montreal with their booty. It is said that he visited the McKay fur store the day before the burglary, as a likely purchaser of a garment, for the purpose of seeing the extent of the stock.

It was Spangenberg's jewelry store that the burglars had planned to rob, but on looking over the place, they thought it too much exposed.
