



HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS Any even numbered section of Domin-ion Lands in Manitoba or the Northwast Provinces, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded upon by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over '18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, of 160 acres more or less. Entry may be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land to be taken is situated, or if the

homesteader desires, he may, on application to the Minister of the Interior, Ottawa, the Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, or the local agent for the district in which the land is situate receive authority for some one to make entry for him.
HOMESTEAD DUTIES: A settler who HOMESTEAD DUTIES: A settler who has been granted an entry for a homestead is required to perferm the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans;

(1) at least six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years.

(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of any person who is eligible to make a homestead entry under the provisions of this Act, resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for by such person as a homestered for by such person as a homestered. entered for by such person as a hometead, the requirements of this Act as to residence prior to obtaining patent may satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother

(8) If the settler has his permanent esidence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his nomestead, the requirements of this Act as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land. said land.
APPLICATION FOR PATENT should be made at the end of three years; be-fore the Local Agent, Sub-Agent of the

he settler must give six months' notice in writing to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa, of his intention YNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST MINING REGULATIONS. Coal.—Coal lands may be purchased at \$10 per acre for soft coal and \$20 for athracite. Not more than 320 acres can be acquired by one individual or company. Itoyaity at the rate of ten cents per ton of 2,000 pounds shall be collected on the gross output.

Quartz.—A free miner's certificate is granted upon payment in advance of \$5 per annum for an individual, and from \$50 to \$100 per annum for a company according to capital.

A free miner, having discovered mineral in place, may, locate a claim 1,500x1.

omestead Inspector.
Before making applications for patent

The fee for recording a claim is \$5.

At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year or paid to the mining resorder in lieu thereof, When \$500 has been expended or paid, the locator may, upon having a survey made, and upon complying with other requirements, purchase the land at \$1 an acre.

The patent provides for the payment of royalty of 2; per cent on the sales.

PLACER mining claims generally are 100 feet square; entry fee \$5, renewable yearly.

A free miner may obtain two leases to dredge for gold of five miles each for a term of twenty years, renewable at the discretion of the Minister of the Interior.

The lessee shall have a dredge in operation within one season from the date of the lease for each five miles. Rental, \$16 per annum for each mile of river leased. Royalty at the rate of 2‡ per cent collected on the output after it exceeds \$10,000.
