THROWN IN BARREL

FATE OF TAILOR WHO CAST AWAY NINE SHARES.

Early Days of Rossland—Gave Suit of Clothes for 5,000 Shares in Le Roi Mine and Despaired of Claim Being Worth Anything.
Rossland, April 12.—In the early days of Rossland, when Le Roi shares were selling at five cents, a shabby-dressed man entered a small tailor shop in a small town in Oregon.
"Tailor," said he, "I want a suit of clothes; but I have no money. If you'll make me a suit I'll give you 5,000 shares of Le Roi stock."
The tailor demurred at first. He wanted cash; but after awhile the persuasive powers of the miner won upon him and he accepted the shares in exchange for the clothes. Three years passed away. Careful development proved that the Le Roi mine was a property of great value and wise men began to gather in odd blocks of the stock; they were able to purchase all shares except 5,000. Advertisements were inserted for the missing shares, without meeting with a response for a long time. After the lapse of some months the tailor's eye happened to meet one of the advertisements. He remembered the 5,000 shares that had been given him for the suit of cloth and which he had thrown into an old soap-box containing rubbish. He had forgotten the name of the mine. In fact, he had regarded the stock as of no value and the suit as good as given away. Finally he decided to look at the certificates and to his joyful surprise found that they were the identical ones that had been advertised for and were worth 87 a share. He surrendered the stock upon payment of their value and departed for Fatherland.
An almost identical incident has just developed at San Francisco. A tailor named Schoenstien went to Toronto a little more than a year ago, and opened a tailor-shop. "One day," relates Schoenstien, "a broken gambler came into my shop. He was clean-eyed and broke after a night at the tables, and broke in the last of the game. He still in his blood, and he wanted to buy more."
"Bill," he knew me well; anyway, first names go in Toronto—"Bill," he remonstrated, "here's a bunch of Toronto Extension Give me fifty shares and its yours."
"My whole capital was \$80, but I decided to buy. I gave him the money and bought a round of drinks, which cost \$2 more."
Schoenstien then went to San Francisco. He left the stock behind when he changed rooms. He later returned for it and was informed by the landlady that it had been thrown into the rubbish in the cellar and might possibly be found there. There in an ash-barrel lay the stock which three weeks ago was worth \$27,500. Schoenstien put the stock in a bank. Four weeks ago he received an offer of \$2,500 for the stock. He accepted. A little later he learned of his sorrow that the stock was worth \$27,500 at the time he sold. Still later he learned that Schwab the steel magnate, had sold for \$500,000. Such is luck!

STOCK MARKETS.

The Prices Paid at Various Centres.
Montreal, April 9.—About 1,100 head of butchers' cattle, 20 milk cows, 120 calves, 30 sheep and lambs, and 100 fat hogs were offered for sale at the East End Abattoir today. The butchers were out strong and trade was good with some pretty high figures paid for fancy Easter beef. Several extra fat steers were sold at about 7c per lb., and a few others at 6c, to 6 1/2c, while a considerable number were sold at 5 1/2c, to 6c, per lb., prime hoeses sold at 5c, to 5 1/2c, pretty good cattle, at 4c, to 4 1/2c, and the common stock at 2 1/2c, to 3 1/2c, per lb. Several very fine bulls were sold at 14c, to 15c, per lb. Milk cows sold at \$90 to \$90 each; common calves, sold at \$2 to \$4, and good veals at \$0 to \$15 each, or 1/2c, to 6/10c, per lb. Sheep sold at \$5 to \$7.50 each, and spring lambs at \$1 to \$7 each. Good lots of fat hogs sold at about 7c per lb.

The Toronto Prices.
Toronto, Junction, April 9.—Export hogs sold at \$3.50, to \$4, butchers' prices for picked lots of choice ranged from \$1.50 to \$1.75; good, from \$1.25 to \$1.50; medium, \$1.75 to \$1; common, \$1.50 to \$1.55; butcher cows, \$3 to \$4; canners, \$2.25 to \$2.75; and calves sold at \$3.50, to \$6.50, per 100 pounds. Milk cows and springers, at \$30 to \$50; sport ewes from \$5 to \$5.75; locks, \$1.50 to \$5; yearling lambs, \$6.50 to \$7.75; spring lambs, \$2.50 to \$6.50; hogs, sales sold at \$7.25; light 90, at \$1.50 to \$1.55; stags, \$2.50 to \$3.50 per 100 pounds.

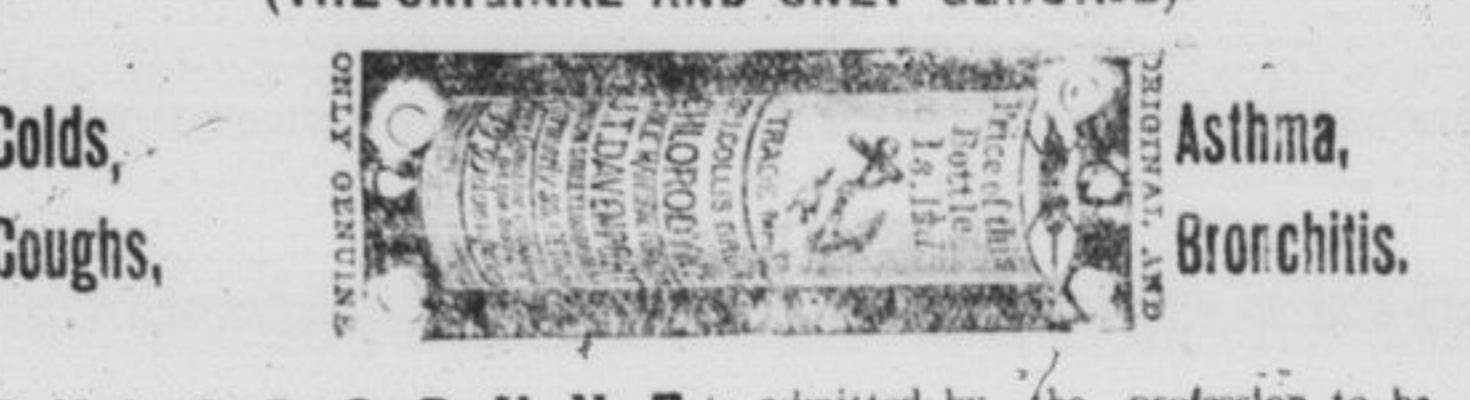
