

COMPANY INSOLVENT. Frontenac Cereal Company to Be

Wound Up.

The Frontenac Cereal company, Kingston milling and elevator concern, with a capital stock of \$600,000. is to be wound up. This action is taken with the consent of the directors, and the business is to be carried on by the liquidator in order that the assets may be realized on at their highest possible value.

The order was made by Chief Justice Mulock on the application of the Ontario Bank, to whom the company is indebted for \$104,000. Half of this amount is secured to the bank. The company admits its insolvency. The \$600,000 stock is divided into
