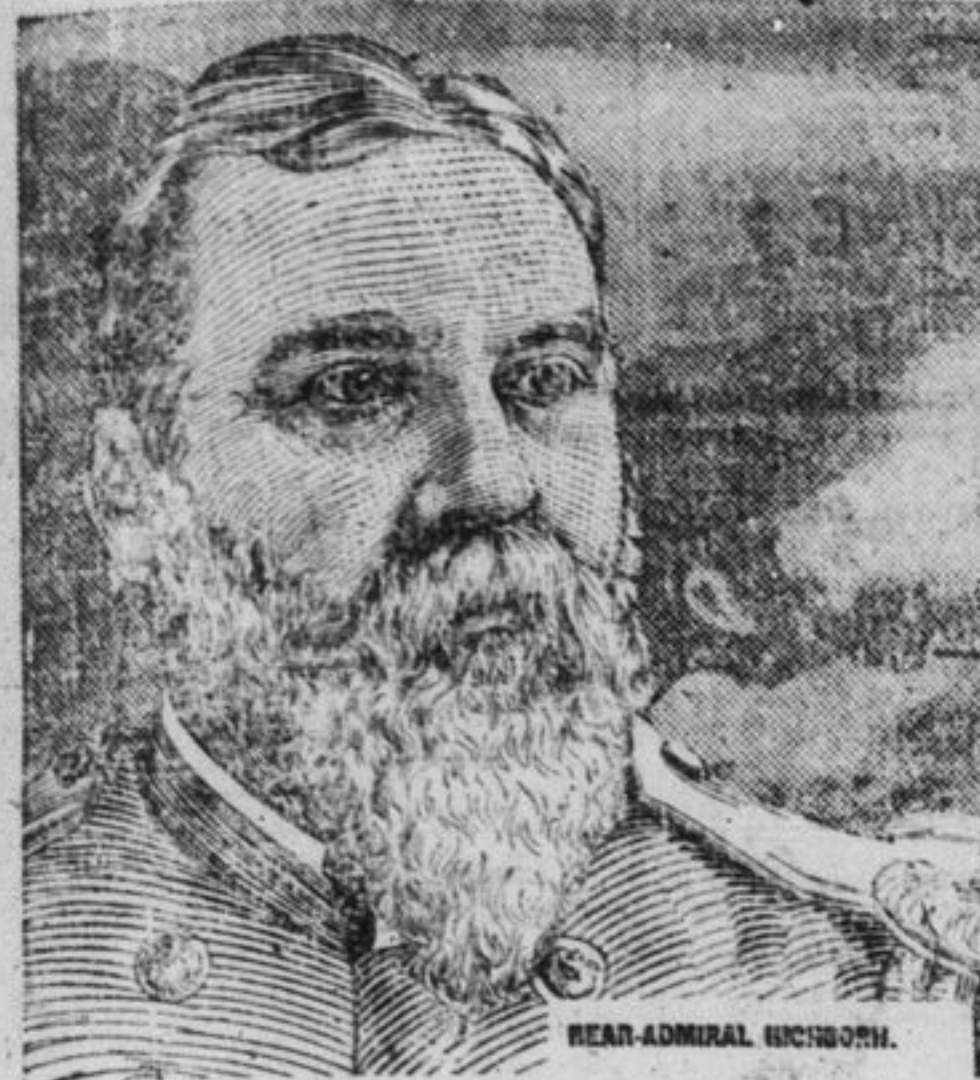

CANADA'S SYMPATHY WITH THE PEOPLE OF SAN FRANCISCO.

Ottawa, April 21.—The first business transacted by the house upon assembling yesterday afternoon, was to give practical proof of the sympathy of the Canadian people with the sufferers by the great catastrophe at San Francisco.
