MEN CURED FIRST THEN THEY PAY.

A LOYAL OUTBURST WHEN PROPOSAL TO INVITE KING CAME UP.

In the Commons—Belcourt Made Speech of Exceeding Grace—Change in Ministry Spoken of—G.T.P. Costing More Than Expected.

Ottawa, April 25.—The same in the Commons when the resolution to invite his majesty, King Edward, and Queen Alexandra, to visit Canada, was remarkable for the spontaneous expression of loyalty from both sides of the house, and from all nationalities and creeds that are represented in our dominion. The Hon. N. A. Belcourt, a distinguished French-Canadian, moved the resolution, and did so in a speech of exceeding eloquence, which there breathed a deep spirit of devotion to the person of the king, and a respect for British institutions.

The speakers of both parties joined in the expressions of good will and loyalty, and the prevailing note was a recognition of the value of the sovereign in international complications.

Mr. Borden declared that the days were long gone by when it was thought that the crown was the mere figurehead, and played no part in the destiny of the nation, but to do its duty.
