APPLICATION FOR PATENT should be made at the end of three years, before the Local Agent, Sub-Agent or the Mining Inspector.

THE FELDMAN TRIAL BRINGS OUT LARGE CROWD OF SPECTATORS.

Empanelling of Jury a Long Proceeding—Several Witnesses Testify in the Fur Robbery Case—The Prisoner Identified.

With the resumption of the cases at the spring assizes, Tuesday morning, a large crowd had gathered to witness the William Feldman trial. Justice Britton presided.

John Cox, Michael O'Leary, E. Palmer, A. Snook, W. Hall, Lucius Kiel, Charles Moutin, William Martin, Howard Lake, J. S. Graham, Robert McVeigh and John Hooper, John Melnyk, K.C., appeared as acting crown prosecuting attorney; J. L. Whitting, K.C., crown prosecutor, also being present, and F. Nicolle and Peter Bercevicoff, Montreal, counsel for the prisoner.

An interested spectator was the wife of the accused man, with her prattling baby on her lap, when her husband was brought in the burst into the court, while the baby chuckled in gleeful delight.

The affixing crown prosecutor, addressed the jury some length on the robbery, and their duties in the case. At 11.10, the first witness for the prosecution, John McKay, owner of the stolen furs, was called. He stated that when he left the building at 9.30, the night of November 18th, all was securely locked. Sunday morning he was informed that the building had been entered. The heavy wooden door of the fur house, and the window were broken. Furs, four in all, were found, were slightly covered with snow; it had not started to snow until after ten o'clock Saturday evening. About \$3,000 worth of furs had disappeared. The Jimmy on exhibit was found in the room juried; it was not his property. Friday or Saturday, 17th or 18th, John Wood was in the store, alone talking to witness.

Mr. Nicolle explained that the furs were perforated with his mark, "J. K." He said his cutter, who was formerly in business, brought to him furs when there were no marks. When witness and Mr. Crews were with Detective Carpenter, the prisoner declared he was never in Kingston. J. Gordon Macpherson, Toronto, stated on the night of the robbery he had an engagement with Mr. McKay and pointed to the building at 10.30 o'clock, saw Feldman standing behind a telephone pole, to Mr. Nicolle, he said he could not give a description of the man.

Henry O'Brien, night clerk at the Randolph hotel, identified the prisoner, Friday midnight, previous to the burglary. In his cross-examination Mr. Nicolle asked for a description of O'Brien in question, but he could not do so.

Charles Schacher was brought into court and identified by the witness as the man who stopped at the hotel on the morning of the 17th. "I was not present when he left," said Mr. O'Brien. With the conclusion of O'Brien's examination, at one o'clock the court made an hour's adjournment.

This afternoon, William Boyd gave evidence, and identified Schacher and Wood as having been here the night of the burglary. P. B. Crews testified as to meeting Feldman on the train going east with a bundle. Detective Charpentier of Montreal also gave evidence.

A New York despatch says that the San Francisco disaster will force ten American and ten foreign companies to the wall.

The western fair board of London appointed A. M. Hunt to succeed J. Nelles, whose resignation of the secretaryship was accepted.

The annual statement of the San Paulo company, was laid before the shareholders on Monday. It shows a net profit of 13 per cent. The gross earnings for the year ended December 31st, 1907, were \$1,908,405.75, an increase of \$189,067.23, or 10 per cent. over the previous year, while the increase in the operating expenses amounted to 40 per cent., resulting in net earnings from operation of \$1,228,478.54, an increase of 31 per cent. over 1907.

Another Reported Safe. This morning, a telegram was received announcing the safety of Dr. W. H. Clark, San Francisco, cousin of J. E. Clark, of this city. Dr. Clark has lived in San Francisco for the past thirty years. He was staying at the United States hotel when the earthquake came, but that hostility escaped serious damage. He was a close friend of Dr. Stinson, formerly of Brantford, who was killed by the falling of the hotel in which he slept.

No word has yet been received from James Chown, brother of Oliver Chown, of this city. He lived with his wife in the centre of San Francisco. His relatives are anxious.

A Young Man Killed. Legmington, Ont., April 24.—While burying a large stone on the farm of Mr. Wigle, near Rutland, this morning, Stanley Otton, aged nineteen, was instantly killed. He was digging a hole beside the stone, when it rolled on to him, crushing out his life. Otton was a son of S. A. Otton, one of the township's best known farmers.
