Additional estimates brought down at Ottawa amount to \$2,845,362.

The London and Lancashire Fire Insurance company loses \$1,000,000 by the San Francisco disaster.

At Antwerp, twelve excursionists were drowned in the River Scheldt, by the capsizing of a ferry boat.

The Dominion government has under consideration the construction of a second ship canal at the Soo.

Hamilton is asking the minister of education to assist in establishing there a school of technology.

Gunner John Barry, on trial at Quebec for murder, attacked one of his guards in the court and tried to choke the constable.

Twelve were killed and fifty wounded in a battle between opposing religious parties in Austria over possession of a church.

Second class rates from St. Paul, over the Soo Line to eastern points in Canada and the United States have been reduced to \$18.

Emperor Nicholas has finally decided to go to St. Petersburg and personally open the first Russian parliament on May 10th.

A coroner's jury decided there was nothing criminal in the cause of the collapse of a water-tank which killed a girl in its fall at Montreal.

Five thousand men will be employed at an early date on the construction of the Saskatoon to Battle River section of the Grand Trunk Pacific.

About \$600 damage was done to a Bradford house through a gas explosion. The occupants, Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Smith, were badly shaken up.

Prince Arthur of Connaught officially opened the horse show in Toronto, this afternoon, in the presence of a very large and fashionable gathering.

Information received by the government from Washington, is that the authorities there will not accept Canada's appropriation for San Francisco sufferers.

Frank Trento, Italian, has been sent to the House of Correction, Detroit, for one year, for attempting to help a young woman from Canada for immoral purposes.

Mortimer Clark, lieutenant-governor of Ontario, and Fred. M. Warner, governor of Michigan, will be invited to attend the Victoria day celebration at Windsor, Ont.

"Billy" Burke, the well-known musical comedy actress, has been left \$30,000 by an American named Willie Sawyer, who perished in the San Francisco disaster.

The murderess of Lieut. Gen. Sakharoff, the former war minister, who was killed at Saratoff, on December 5th last, has confessed that her real name is Anastasia Buzenkova.

On dit that a partnership has been entered between M. J. O'Brien, Renfrew, and A. R. Macdonald, the well-known railway builder, to build a part of the National Transcontinental railway.

A strike of the 160,000 miners in the anthracite coal region is generally regarded as unlikely. Negotiations are proceeding for adjusting differences and a resumption of mining for years to come.

Mrs. Mary Hannah Hunt, world and national superintendent of the department of scientific instruction of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, died at her home in Boston, Mass. after an illness of several months.

The new by-law passed by the Municipal Council yesterday places all cigar shops, fruit stores, eating houses and billiard rooms under direct police supervision, and forbids children entering pool and billiard rooms at all.

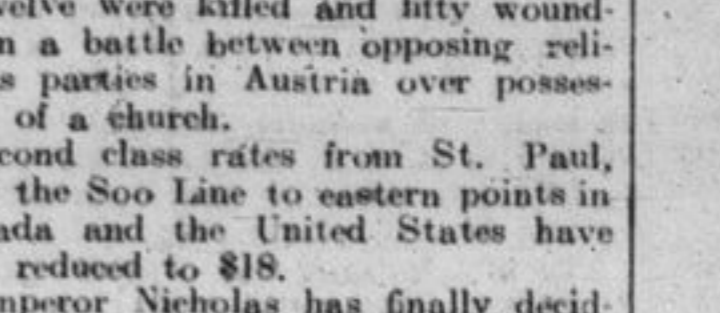
