Houses Burned at Verona. A despatch from Verona says: Fire broke out about two o'clock Wednesday morning on the Jackson promenade south east of the railway station, and burned it and the adjacent building owned by H. Dickson. The fire was got under four hours after its vigorous work by the villagers. For a time it was dangerous, as a north-west wind was blowing. The Jackson property was tenanted by W. F. Watson, who was away from home. The loss will be about \$3,000, partly covered by insurance.

Returned To Montreal. Yesterday afternoon a Russian Jew was found who could converse with the four Poles, who arrived here by K. & P. railway, without knowing whether they were bound. It was decided that their destination was Frontenac street, Montreal, and under instructions from C. J. R. headquarters, the K. & P. officials sent the foreigners back.

Found Dead In Bed. James Watt, an old resident, formerly a well-known carter, was found dead in his bed this morning in his house on Division street, where he lived alone. Coroner Mundell was notified, but after examining the body decided that death was due to heart disease.

A Steamer Grounded. About eleven o'clock this morning, while coming down the harbor to the M. T. company elevator, the steamer Wallace, corn laden from Chicago, got out of the channel and grounded out opposite the government drydock. The tug Bronson and Frontenac went to her assistance.

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THE MORNING'S DAWN

LIGHTED APPROACH TO NORMAL CONDITIONS.

Street Railways Ready to Begin. —Flurry of Water on Hand—A New and More Beautiful City Looked For. San Francisco, Cal. April 25.—At dawn, this morning, conditions began to look normal. Such parts of trade as remain unburned are opening for the transaction of ordinary business. Temporary structures are being run up for the accommodation of others. Clearing of the devastated area of its ruins is well under way. The inquiry into the condition of the bank vaults is completed. The organization and preparation for service of the street railways are, so far advanced that the company expressed its readiness to resume business as soon as the mayor would permit.

The water company has completed such repairs as enable it to supply a total of 12,000,000 gallons daily. It is now strongly probable that the ashes of the ruined city will give birth to the San Francisco beautifully planned by David Durban. Definite steps towards this end have been taken by a group of citizens.

A Salinas Horror. San Francisco, Cal. April 25.—The secretary of the department of commerce and labor, Victor H. Metcalfe, has arrived from Washington. He will be in charge, supervising the general representative of President Roosevelt. A despatch from Salinas, a summer resort in Marine county, says that the Flag Staff Inn, a large hotel there, has been swept into the bay. Many persons have narrow escapes. The Water House—studio rolled down a steep cliff into the bay. Many houses were ruined. Accurate advices show that the business centre and half of the residence section of San Jose were damaged or destroyed. The loss will aggregate \$8,000,000. Nineteen persons were killed, 200 injured and 5,000 are homeless.

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GIVEN FIVE YEARS

FELDMAN CONVICTED OF ROBBERY M'KAY'S

Of Furs to the Value of \$3,000—Mrs. Feldman Wept When the Verdict Was Rendered—The Judge's Remarks. At two o'clock the jury returned with the verdict "guilty" in the Feldman trial. There was another good-sized crowd in attendance to hear the final in the case. When the foreman of the jury had given the verdict, the wife who has been in constant attendance burst into piteous sobbing.

Asked what he had to say, the prisoner, William Feldman, replied: "I have been found guilty and I only ask mercy on behalf of my wife and child who are left to suffer."

The two prisoner-witnesses, Schacher and Wertz, implicated in the McKay fur robbery, have yet to have their police court hearings. They will appear before Magistrate Farrell, on Friday morning, and if remanded will have to await the fall session. As Wood has admitted his connection with the burglary, it is likely he will plead guilty to the magistrate and be sentenced immediately.
