NEWS OF THE WORLD OCCURRENCES RECOUNTED IN BRIEF FORM.

Matters That Interest Everybody—Notes From All Over—Little of Everything Easily Read and Remembered. The liquor bill was passed by the legislature last night. American capitalists will erect a large flax mill in Saskatchewan. Mrs. Dowie, on Thursday, paid a visit to her husband in Chicago. The Dominion golf reduction works at Kinross were burned on Thursday. President Mitchell has sent a counter proposition to the anthracite owners. It is understood that ex-President Willard will move an amendment to the liquor bill. The Canadian Northern R.R. hopes to have its Hudson's Bay railway open some time in 1908. A large tract of land has been selected near Tisdale, Man., for a Salvation Army colony. Charles L. Stinson, former steel manufacturer, was killed by a train at River Forest, Ill. The weather continues ideal in the west for seeding, and the great bulk of the wheat is in the ground. Major Street, who was in the Fenian raid of '66, is dead, in Winnipeg. The legislature of Alberta has decided that Edmonton shall continue to be the capital of the province. The Queen's Own Rifles left Toronto, Thursday night, for New York, to participate in a military tournament. John Wiegman, farmer, of McCreary, Man., while attempting to rob a cow's nest, had his right eye torn out by the bird. Two U.S. sentries, in the Fort Hamilton reservation, were found shot dead, and secret service men are investigating. A battery of horse artillery and three companies of Infantry Fusiliers, now in Crete, have been ordered to Egypt. A report that British troops have been ordered to South Africa is denied, but reinforcements have been sent to Egypt. Russian elections in the Baltic provinces have resulted in the complete defeat of the Germans, who compose the land owning class. All traffic on the Great Lakes is in danger of being suspended through a strike of all men employed by the Lake Carriers' Association. King Edward's visit to Prince Nicholas, ruler of Montenegro, is regarded in some quarters as being an anti-Serbian demonstration. Interesting Items on Various Sporting Matters. Larry Roper, the Toronto baseball player, has left to join the Winnipeg club. Both the Toronto and Tecumseh lacrosse clubs have been admitted to membership in the National Amateur Lacrosse Union. The Toronto canoe club has accepted the invitation of the Pittsburgh regatta committee to send a four to compete against Tacoma on July 4th. The first of the annual and league baseball matches will be played to-morrow at two o'clock on the cricket field: Alerts vs. Y.M.C.A.; Victorias vs. Granites. E. Daniels, New York Athletic club, holder of the world's championship 100 yards swimming record, won the final heat in the 100 metres swimming race at the Olympia games in Athens. Pitcher Briggs, formerly with Toronto who was last year with the Chicago Nationals, has been signed by Manager Sebring, of Williamsport. Briggs was traded by Chicago to Brooklyn in a refused to report. The English bowlers will arrive at Montreal on July 28th and will remain in charge of the Ontario Bowling Association until August 17th. Games are to be played at Montreal, Kingston, Peterboro, Toronto, Hamilton, St. Catharines, Niagara, Guelph, Brantford, and possibly several other places in the jurisdiction of the Ontario association, before the English bowlers are turned over to the western bowlers. The Ottawa Capitals will hold their first practice at variety oval on Monday next. In discussing the probable line-up for the coming season, some fans closely allied to the Capitals pick out the following team as about the nearest thing to any that will participate in the first game: Goal, Errett; point, Marsh; cover, Brennan; defence, Shea, Bally and Inglis; centre, Ashfield; home, Butterworth, Eastwood and Powers; inside, Gault outside, Allen. Before starting on the United States tour the "Varsity" lacrosse team will play Woodbridge on May 12th and likely Woodbridge during the week of May 14th. The itinerary through the states will be: May 21st, Hobart College at Geneva; May 25th, Rochester at Rochester; May 26th, Greenacre at Bay Ridge; June 1st, Brantford at Bay Ridge; June 2nd, Swartmore at Swartmore. It is likely that the team will stay at a Buffalo to play a game on the way home. Toronto Mail-Express: The University of Toronto Hockey club has elected Herbert Clark, their brilliant centre forward, captain for next season. With the exception of "Stinky" Broadfoot, the blue and white "Governor" point, the team will be intact. Indications point to the collegians having lots of good material to choose from when the ice comes round again. Big Fanny Hankin, of the Stratford Pioneers, will be a candidate for the forward line next year, and Roy Thomas will figure in goal. Kingston's Lacrosse Club. The lacrosse club will hold a meeting, to-night in the Whig building to which all local sports are asked to attend and lend their interest. The club is now quite organized and it is proposed to begin working in the way of selecting a team.
