COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

What Is Going On in the Business World—The Markets.

All grades of refined sugar were advanced ten cents a hundred pounds at New York.

Sir John will secure a new industry. Merritt and Murphy of Hingham will locate a stove and plating mill there.

The Hamilton Towler company, of Nantais, B.C., are increasing their plant at a cost of \$250,000. The most extensive part of the new machinery will be a complete electric plant of a capacity of 100 horse power.

The output of the Crow's Nest collieries for the week ending April 27th, was 17,500 tons, or a daily average of 2,375 tons. Corresponding week last year, 15,200 tons, daily average 2,175.

The attention of Canadians is drawn to the market for golden syrup in South Africa. That country annually imports \$1,000,000 worth, the bulk of which comes from Great Britain. Canadians ought to secure this trade, as they have the advantage in ocean freight to the extent of 50 per cent.

The Western Electric company, of Berlin, have ordered to their plant two large stamping presses, weighing 4,500 pounds each and other machinery, making a complete equipment for the production of trunk trimmings, corners and clamps. These are not imported from Germany and the United States.

The Western Power company were recently granted a franchise to generate, transmit and distribute electric power at Brandon, Man., but as the Manitoba legislature has been more than 30 years, this franchise has been changed to a 25-year term. A vote of the ratepayers will be taken on the new proposition this month.

TWO GREAT MEN

SIR SANDFORD FLEMING AND ANDREW CARNEGIE MEET.

Former Presents Letter With Queen's D.C.L. Diploma, and Makes Felicitous Speech—Principal Gordon Hands Him the Gown.

Ottawa, April 30.—An interesting ceremony took place today, at the residence of Sir Sandford Fleming, where Mr. Carnegie was entertained and luncheon. He consisted in the presentation to the latter of the diploma of D.C.L., conferred upon him at the recent convocation of Queen's University. Sir Sandford Fleming said in making the presentation: "On the day you came into this beautiful world in the famous historical Scottish town of Dunfermline, another boy of tender years was probably playing marbles in the Langton of Kirkcaldy, a few miles distant. These two met for the first time here in Ottawa, not far from three score and ten years having elapsed. You are now lord mayor of St. Andrew's University, Scotland; the second boy is now and for thirty-five years has been chancellor of Queen's University, Canada. When in convocation a few days ago, I had, as chancellor, the high distinction of conferring on you the highest honor in our gift. In anticipation of this meeting, I sent for the principal of Queen's to appear here to-day, to assist me in conveying to you knowledge of our action, and to aid in completing the function of bestowing upon you the degree I now receive from him, and with unalloyed pleasure transfer to you, Dr. Carnegie, the roll of parchment setting forth that you are one of the youngest honorary graduates of Queen's University. Before I ask Principal Gordon to do, whatever I have left unsaid, I feel that I must give expression to the unfeigned happiness of both of us here. I have the rare and joyful distinction of being an honorary graduate of two great universities on opposite sides of the Atlantic. By a singular good fortune the heads of both are here. I have the rare and double satisfaction of welcoming both to Canada, and breaking bread with Dr. Carnegie, and Dr. Butler, representatives of St. Andrew's and Columbia respectively of my own Canadian home."

Principal Gordon, in handing the gown to Mr. Carnegie, said the tone and spirit of Queen's was very much that of St. Andrew's, always bearing in mind the fact that the institution was formed for the purpose of keeping open the path between the farm-house and the university. He hoped that Mr. Carnegie would long be spared to continue his beneficent work, and that the same day he would pay a visit to Queen's.

Mr. Carnegie for once was taken by surprise, but it was evident from his beaming countenance that he was deeply honored by the honor done him. Grasping Sir Sandford warmly by the hand, he addressed him as "my dear fellow-filer," and then went on to say how feeble his words must be to fitly express his appreciation of the great honor done him. He spoke of the good it was possible to do in this world, and declared that it was a blessed thing to be able to benefit one's fellow-men. After these proceedings were over, the company repaired to the front of the house, and were photographed.

A CITIZEN'S COMPLAINT

This case of driving cattle on such a fine street is not a new one, but should be stopped. Cannot back streets be used?

LIKELY TO RESIGN.

A MOTORING BILL

WILL BE DISCUSSED ON THURSDAY MORNING.

Legislature Approves of Municipal Amendment Act—The Hospital Scheme is Dead.

Toronto, May 1.—The municipal committee of the legislature, this morning, approved of the municipal amendment act of 1906, which embodied the amendments contained in the bills passed by the committee during the session. From Mr. Hanna's intimation that the business of the house would be finished by the 10th or 11th. The committee will devote Thursday morning to a discussion of automobile legislation. The bills introduced by Messrs. Cannon and Sutcliffe, proposing further restrictions, are under consideration by a select committee.

The receipts of the provincial secretary's department, for the current year, promise to be ahead of all previous records by a very large margin. Up to yesterday the gross receipts from January last totalled \$70,665, an increase of \$23,000. The total gross receipts for 1905 were \$131,914; so that the first four months of this year show a total of more than half what was received all last year.

Toronto, May 1.—A hospital bill for consumptives for the present. The Private Bills Committee of the legislature were overwhelmingly against the plan, this morning, and disallowed the expenditure of \$50,000 for the erection of the hospital. A by-law passed by the ratepayers was held to contemplate merely the contribution of existing institutions of the money voted.

DISTRICT DASHES.

Latest Items in Our Many Exchanges.

The Bishop of Ontario paid his annual visit to Christ Church, Belleville, and administered the rite of confirmation upon twenty-four candidates.

On Saturday death claimed an estimable lady of Brockville, Mrs. Henry Gendall, who passed away a victim of paralysis. She was aged sixty years.

Saturday night there passed away at his father's residence in Yonge Mills a well known young man, Toronto Purvis, eldest son of James Purvis, aged thirty-four years.

Two well-known and popular Brockvillians, Leonard Howison and Miss Florence Fitzpatrick, youngest and only daughter of Mrs. John Fitzpatrick, at present residing in New Haven, Conn., were united in marriage in Brockville, on Monday.

A sad death at St. Vincent de Paul hospital, Belleville, on Monday, was that of Mrs. George Weatherell, (nee Miss Eliza Dunham), following an illness of some weeks. Deceased, a daughter of William Dunham, was only married Christmas night last.

The death took place Sunday evening of Mrs. Eliza Jane Johnston, widow of the late Alderman Johnston, Belleville, after a few days' illness from a general breaking up of the system. The deceased was born in Prince Edward county, seventy-eight years ago.

Ireland's New Great Seal.

The new Great Seal of Ireland is distinguishable from the English emblem in a very small particular only. This is that the conventional border beneath the table a crowned harp is substituted for a trident. It is also an interesting fact that the large medals are struck in silver in the large medal press at the mint—a method never before attempted—and that the seal and pointer's seal of Ireland received no fewer than 793 blows before they were perfected.

Marine Paragraphs.

Capt. Henry Esford left to-day for Toronto to bring down the steamer Kingston to enter the government dock, the latter part of this week.

The steamer Turbinia did not arrive in port to-day to go on the dry dock, as was expected. She has probably been delayed in the Cornwall canal.

Appeal Was Allowed.

Quebec, May 1.—In the matter of McCraw, the murderer, who has been sentenced to be hanged at Three Rivers, in June next, appeal was allowed this morning, by court of appeal, Judge Lacombe, Tremblay, Lavergne and Simon, being present, and the case was continued to the October term.

The insurance commission resumed its proceedings this morning in Toronto, and Mr. Junkin, manager of the Manufacturers Life, was called to tell about some of the stock transactions of the company.

FITTH OF THE NEWS.

The Very Latest Culled From All Over The World.

Ice dealers in Toronto have made a general advance in prices.

Toronto horse show receipts were \$16,400, a falling off of \$1,100.

Toronto's tax rate has been fixed by the board of control at 18 1/2 mills.

The salary of Mayor Lumsden, Toronto, is to be increased by \$1,500.

The late ex-Ald. James Crane, Toronto, left an estate valued at \$62,363.

William Hendrie, Hamilton, is slightly weaker than last night and partly unconscious.

A protest has been entered against the local option by-law passed in the Township of South Mountain.

Reconstruction of San Francisco has begun in earnest. As a result many destitute men secured work.

The plumbers of St. Catharines went on strike, this morning, for an increase of five cents per hour.

The SS. Numidian, Allan line, from Glasgow, for Montreal, passed Cape Magdalen at 9 a.m., to-day.

The Marathon race took place, at Athens, Greece, to-day, and was won by Sherring, of Hamilton, in 21 minutes.

Eighty-five members of the Carriage and Waggon Makers' Union, Toronto, will go on strike for a nine-hour day.

The Canadian Manufacturers' Association have been notified to give up their offices in the board of trade building, Toronto.

Eighty-five carriage workers went on strike to-day, at Toronto to enforce a demand for a nine-hour day, with overtime pay.

At New York, Recorder Goff said that gross negligence and incompetence exists somewhere in the enforcement of law in that city.

The United Railway company has promised to give San Francisco, within a short time, a better system of transit than existed before the fire.

To-day, not a pound of ore, coal or grain is being handled in the port of Cleveland. The same condition exists in practically every Lake Erie port.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier says personally he is inclined to a reform of the senate. He intimates that senators should be selected by the various legislatures.

It has been arranged to have the census of population and agriculture in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, taken on the night of Sunday, June 24th.

At Melilla, Morocco, the Moroccan gunboat Sidi El Turki has seized the bark Beni Bujafan, carrying a commercial cargo, and put to sea with her captive.

Mrs. Mary McKittrick, Uniontown, Pa., who recently celebrated her 108th birthday anniversary, committed suicide by cutting her throat with a small knife.

Great labor demonstrations are being held in Hyde Park, London, this afternoon. The same demonstration was given up entirely to the pupils of Socialist Sunday schools.

At Washington, Representative W. R. Hearst, New York, introduced a resolution appropriating \$2,500,000 additional for the relief of San Francisco earthquake sufferers.

At a meeting of the opening of the London and Hamilton Presbyterian sisterhood, held in Zion church, Brantford, Ont., last night, Rev. Dr. Ross, Port Dalhousie, was elected moderator.

The supreme court has decided that the city engineer of Toronto, with the approval of the city, should decide the time of the use of open cars to be discontinued in autumn and resumed in the spring.

Six hundred strikers coming out of the Paris labor exchange ran into the four-masted barque Kate Thomas, collided with New Haven, Scotland. The barque sank immediately. She was bound for London from South America, with a cargo of nitrate of soda valued at \$50,000. Eleven of the crew were killed. The bodies of the Thomas when the collision occurred; twelve others were picked up. Five of the crew are missing.

Repairing The Roads.

Chairman Carson, of the board of works, says that the work of repairing the roads will start in a few days. The crusher is at work getting stone ready. Alderman Carson says that special attention will be paid to blocks whose centres have no crown. The sides of the road will be chopped or plowed, and the material will be spread in the centre of the road and rolled.
