The council met again. Wednesday morning, when Mr. Whiting appeared before it and explained the provisions in regard to counties, expropriating toll roads. The county council bound to appoint an arbitrator when petitioned by fifty ratepayers of three municipalities, unless they could agree themselves with othe road company about a price for the road. county council, however, need not accept the arbitration price.

It was announced that Mr. Fair was fered to take \$8,500 for the road. The toll roads' committee offered \$3,000.

Mr. Fair would give up to the county that part of the road from the bridge to Inverary. Then let the county repair the bridge.
