**Hitting The Farmers.**

The Weekly Sun, the farmers' paper, is out of all fashion with the government in its treatment of railway taxation. It reveals what the Whitney party proposed in the session of 1901. They wanted Mr. Pettipiece to force his bill upon the government, to refuse it the consideration which it afterwards got from a special commission.

When the general assessment bill was going through the house, Mr. Whitney, Mr. Hanna, Mr. Downey, and Mr. Clark were very anxious that the Pettipiece plan of taxation should be adopted. This meant the assessment of railway lands at the rate of \$250 per mile. They charged Mr. Pettipiece with making "a meal of his principles." They tried to stampede the government and failed.

Later, the commission, of which Mr. Pettipiece was chairman, made an exhaustive enquiry into the subject, and as a result recommended that the railways be assessed at the rate of three per cent. on their gross income, which would be equivalent to \$150 per mile. The government has had "a hen on" for some time, and as an outcome it abandons the Pettipiece legislation, past and present, and recommends a doubling of the present flat rate, making the total revenue about \$352,000. "This flat rate," says the Sun, "is inequitable as towards the railways, and no precedent for it can be found in any state in which railways are taxed."

Moreover, "under the Pettipiece bill, for Mr. Whitney and his forty-two followers voted in 1901, railway and farm property would have been out on an equality as to taxation. Under the bill now before the legislature farmers will pay \$2.50 on the same value on which railways will pay \$1." It is a pleasant prospect for the farmers and one which must tickle them as they contemplate what they have done for Mr. Whitney and his friends.

**Getting At The Facts.**

The grievance which Mr. Foster aired in parliament, and with the vehemence of language which has seldom been exceeded, was that the government had entered into a contract with a private corporation unjustly. He charged that parliament had not been informed of it, that the North Atlantic company was a grafting scheme; that the members of the company were not known, and that before they were incorporated an agreement had been made with them; that they had been paid many thousands of dollars; that it could not be shown that the money was earned; and that the beneficiaries by the deal were those the government was trying to serve.

The debate covered several days, during which its spirit became bitter, and there was a disposition to indulge in personalities. Naturally enough Mr. Foster, because offensive himself, unnecessarily so, was made the object of sharp assaults. These included a recital of some transactions in which he had engaged, and that could not be considered creditable to him.

Truth to tell the real status of the case was only learned when the premier stated the facts. The North Atlantic company was simply a looking concern, corresponding to the agencies that had been set up in Europe for many years, and under different governments. There were some countries in which immigrant agents could work openly, and some where they could not work at all, with the knowledge of the powers-that-be.

Sir Wilfrid Lynd from the public records which had been laid before parliament in 1901-2, a full statement of the North Atlantic company, its work and relations with the government; and he quoted from the estimates passed by parliament the provision which had been made for the cost of all immigration service, including that of the North Atlantic company. So that there was nothing mysterious about the case, and nothing in the way of a surprise or revelation. It simply continued the work that the conservative government had projected, lacking the success which set in with 1896, because the interior department had been without the energy and push which Mr. Sifton put into its work, with the liberals added to power.

"Sir Wilfrid Lynd struck the keynote of the whole debate, when he said, that if there was anything wrong about the contract, any grafting for the benefit of people who should not profit by it, he would be glad to hear of it. The opposition was invited to prefer its charges and he would place at the disposal of Mr. Foster or any other man the facilities of parliament in order that its integrity might be ascertained. Some of Mr. Foster's

charges he declared to be without foundation. His love for scandal was unbecoming, and his profession for purity would come with better grace from some one else. The member for North Toronto, has, indeed, been receiving some hard knocks this session, but he has deserved them all.

**Whitney As A Bluffer.**

Mr. Whitney has not yet become accustomed to office. He carries about with him the air of bluff which he distinguished himself while in opposition—after the party thought of supplanting him. The man who leads an assembly, who represents its intelligence and dignity as no other man does, should be above the tactics in which he indulges.

He wants Mr. Ross and his liberal associates to understand that he knows something. He is not anxious to tell it, because it will be injurious to his opponents, but he will lift the lid and let it go if they do not behave. Above them hang, metaphorically, the sword of Damocles, and at his bidding it will fall and do terrible damage. And all this time he does not know enough to keep still and preserve a discreet silence.

A "thrilling incident," according to the Mail, was the attempt of Mr. Whitney to browbeat Mr. Ross on Tuesday afternoon. The discussion was on the choice of school examiners, and the liberal leader facetiously enquired how they were to be selected? Like the drainage referes of which they had heard so much? Mr. Whitney flamed up at once. He had it that Mr. Ross sent a drainage commissioner on an improper errand once.

Mr. Ross denied the charge. Mr. Whitney said Mr. Ross had sent a man into Stormont county in the winter season when he could not take a level and when an election was pending. The letter of instruction was at hand. "Produce it," said Mr. Ross. "Refer it to a committee. Let us have an inquiry, and all the evidence shown of an alleged wrongdoing." The liberal leader said the game of bluff which Mr. Whitney was playing had become wearying. It was time it ceased.

There is a good deal of cowardice about the government. The members of it were going to demonstrate to the world the rottenness of liberal rule, and so far they have failed to do it. They have possession of the departments and the public records, and they have the power. Why do they not make good their threats?

When the Ross government went to the rescue or salvation of the Soo industries, Mr. Whitney said the money was gone, that the two millions of dollars might as well be "thrown into the lake." The government has benefited. The money has been paid. The Soo industries are thriving. Who was the wise man and friend of the country in this case?

Rombay, May 3.—A curious tale is going the rounds of the bazaars in India. It is believed by every native that Gen. Kuroki, the marvellous Japanese commandeur, is no other than Sir Hector Macdonnell.

Many persons have never believed that the brilliant English general is dead, and not long ago there appeared in the London Times an offer of a reward of \$5,000 to anyone who had seen his dead body.

It is also a fact that Sir Hector was once invited to go to Japan to train the Japanese army, and he actually mentioned it to Lord Roberts. No honor has ever been publicly bestowed on Kuroki, who seems to have vanished as suddenly and mysteriously as he appeared.

Sir Hector Macdonnell, with all their reticence, confessed to a correspondent that Kuroki had much foreign blood in him, and one United States journalist declared he was a Dutchman.
