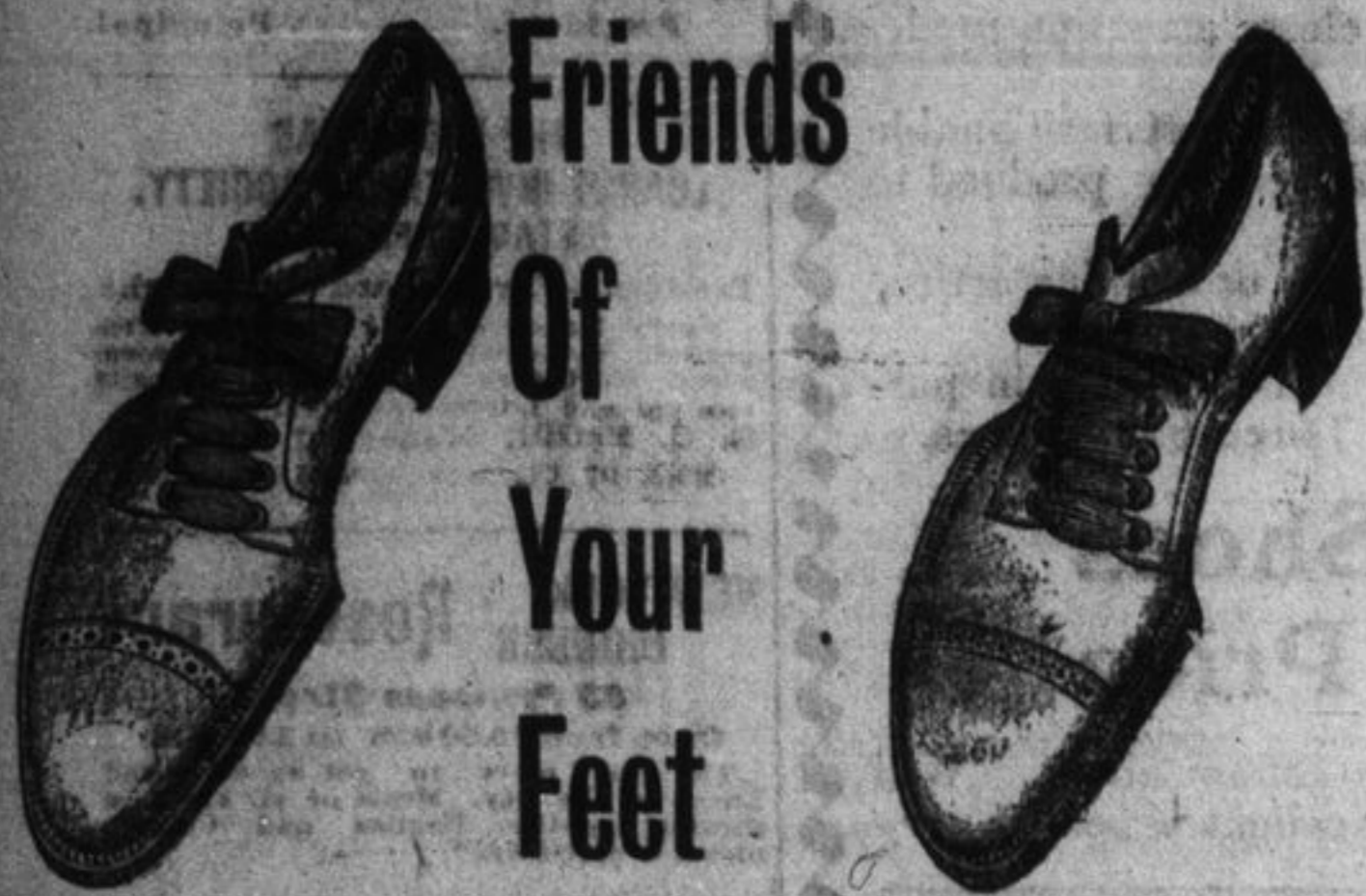

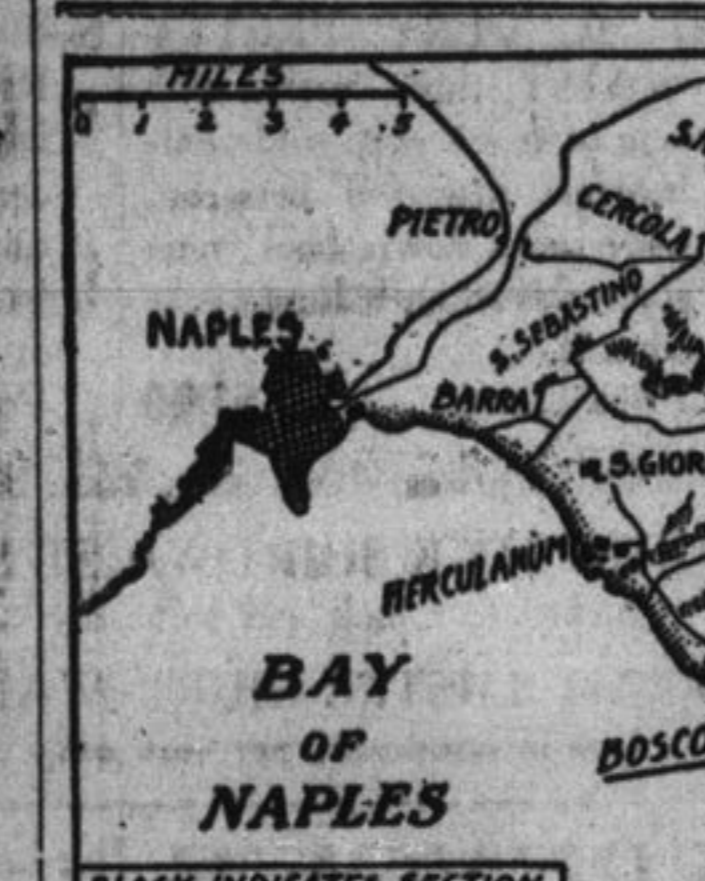
The Tidings From Various Points In Eastern Ontario - What People Are Doing And What They Are Saying.

BRITAIN'S DEBT

IT IS SAID TO BE NEAR FOUR BILLIONS.

It is the Purpose of the Liberal Government to Make Strenuous Efforts to Cut it Down.

London, May 2.—The enormous total of the British national debt, which is now \$3,944,950,000, was commented on at considerable length by Chancellor of the Exchequer Asquith in the House of Commons yesterday. He referred especially to the floating debt, amounting to \$278,750,000, and declared it a source of the greatest disquietude because in case of a sudden emergency it would seriously hamper the nation's borrowing power. His Chancellor Asquith repeated the statement that it is the intention of the liberal government to do its utmost to reduce expenditures. He said he believed his colleagues in the cabinet when they submitted the figures for 1906-7, will enable him to effect a substantial saving without weakening the efficiency of the national service.

MONEY IN AN IDEA.

Fortunes Made by the Recognizers.—Few persons have the happy faculty of recognizing the value of an idea. As a rule the exceptions become millionaires. About twenty years ago a grocer in a small English town came into possession of a recipe for a new soap. He invested all his small capital, gave the soap a striking name, and his success was phenomenal.

At present 1,000,000 tons of the soaps are turned out at the home factories, and the proprietor has expended \$1,750,000 in building a model village for his employees—all because he employed new ideas in the manufacture of soap.

A certain brand of pills brings in \$400,000 annually to the proprietor, because he has exercised his wit in bringing their virtues before the public.

In order to secure the process for curing a certain kind of bacon, a firm paid \$50,000, but the returns have amply justified the expenditure.

The monks who make the famous Chartreuse, have defied every attempt at discovery of their secret; but, if they wished to sell, the price could scarcely be too large.

Bank of England notes are printed on paper the manufacture and texture of which form a profound secret, but which has yielded a fortune to the inventor. United States paper money is also printed upon paper of a composition as zealously guarded.

One man makes a fortune on a seaweed, preparing it which forms the basis of his anti-rheumatic. The man who learned the secret of making fine Irish whiskeys died worth \$20,000,000. Various pills and ointments have proved gold mines to inventors. The man who has conceived a catchy idea by means of which to bring his wares before the public has usually won financial success.
