

BILLIONS.

Government to Make Strenu-London, May 3.-The enormous tota now \$3,944,950,000, was commented on at considerable length by Chancel lor of the Exchequer Asquith in the House of Commons yesterday. He referred especially to the floating debt, amounting to \$278,750,000, and declared it a source of the greatest disuietude because in case of a sudden emergency it would seriously hamper the nation's borrowing power.

Chancellor Asquith repeated the statement that it is the intention of most to reduce expenditures. He said believed his colleagues in the cabinet when they submit their figures for 1906-7, will enable him to effect a substantial saving without weakening the ciency of the national service.
