Lieut. Campbell, of the 14th Regiment, leaves in a short time to spend several months abroad.

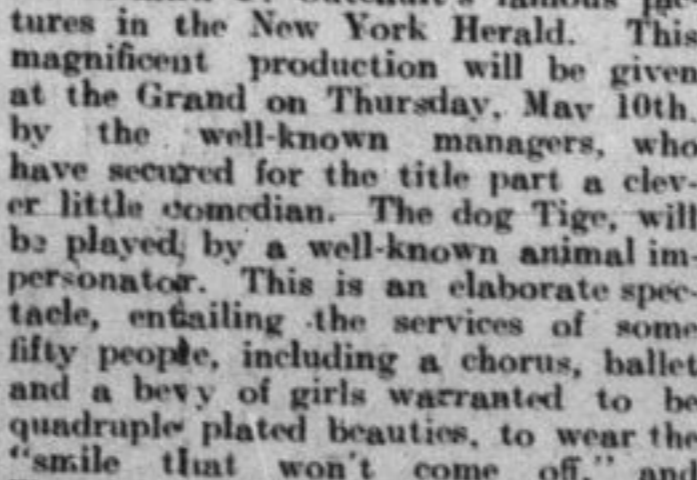
PRICES TO INCREASE. The Drinking Public Will Have to Pay More.
