On this he composed all the songs that have added to his fame. And not only did Mr. Sankey compose his own songs on this organ; not only did he use it in nearly all the meetings in which he took so prominent a part, but on it he tried the songs of others, which were included with his own in the books that he edited song books that have had a circulation exceeding that of any publication with the exception of the Bible.

Mr. Sankey played on this organ long before he dreamed of becoming an evangelist. He always loved music, and he cannot remember when he did not sing. He bought the organ not long after he returned from the civil war, and he composed five hundred gospel hymns upon it.

Mr. Sankey would never sit with his back to his audience. By facing them he impressed them with his magnetic personality and there seemed to flow out to his hearers the inspiration that he felt as the words and notes of his hymns were wafted in music from him.
