OUR NEW SETTLERS
SEEM TO BE VERY DESIR-
ABLE CLASS.
Interest Taken, in Canada, in All
Colonies of the Empire—Desire
for Particular, Rather Than
General Information Respect-
ing Dominion.

London, E.C., April 25.—(To the
Editor): You will be interested, I
think, in learning something of the
extraordinary boom in emigration
which exists at the present time in
the United Kingdom, a boom which
owes its origin and sustenance very
largely to the campaign which is be-
ing conducted by Mr. Freston, on be-
half of the Dominion government.
We, ourselves, (the management of
The Colonizer) have received over 25,
000 letters from would-be emigrants
during the past few months, and I
have been our pleasure to give such
advice to those enquirers as to cause
a very large proportion of the whole
number to proceed to various parts
of the Dominion, from Nova Scotia in
the east, to Vancouver in the west.
We ourselves have been surprised to
find that a good proportion of these
have been possessed of reasonable
amounts of money, ranging from £100
to £2,000 or £3,000, so that they con-
stitute a very notable gain to the
new country in which they settle.

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A BIG LAND FRAUD
THE GOVERNMENT MAKES A
CHARGE OF CONSPIRACY.
All Ranks Are Included—Men
Rang From Saloonkeepers to
Editors—Heavy Bonds Are
Fixed.

Portland, Ore., May 7.—Late Satur-
day night, United States District At-
torney W. C. Bristol made public the
names of twenty-one persons against
whom a government land fraud in-
dictment was returned by a federal
grand jury. The indictment charges
conspiracy to secure 200,000 acres of
timber land in Crook Lake and
Klamath counties, Oregon. If the al-
legations of the indictments are true
the mode of operations was similar
to those of nearly all the conspiracies
which have been found in this state.
Warrants will be issued at once for the
arrest of the accused, who range in
occupation from saloon-keepers to law-
yers, editors and business men.

PULP WOOD'S DRAIN
On Forests Shewn to Be Very
Great.
The forest service of the United
States department of agriculture has
furnished a preliminary statement
showing there was used in the past
year in the United States more than
3,000,000 cords of wood in the manu-
facture of wood pulp. The returns were
from 150 firms controlling 232 mills.
The wood process as follows: Soda
chips, 1,538,000 cords; soda, 410,000
cords; ground wood, 1,068,000 cords.
The total pulp production by all pro-
cesses by the firms reporting was 1,
093,000 tons. According to the census
of 1900, the consumption of pulp wood
was then 1,986,310 cords, so that there
has been an increase of over fifty per
cent in the last six years. This de-
monstrates, in a striking manner, the
drain upon the forests caused by the
pulp industry.

OUTSIDERS AT WORK,
But Not Likely to Foment Any
Trouble.
Montreal, May 7.—Officials of the
Longshoremen's Union intimate that
the reports of trouble among the
workers arise from attempts of out-
siders, from Portland and St. John,
N.B., to foment trouble but there will
be no general strike this year as
1,800 members are satisfied with pre-
sent conditions. The members dis-
claim any part in helping to make
trouble for the outsiders.

Is Rapidly Improving.
Capt. Borgard, of the steamship
Turbinia, who has been confined to
the general hospital with blood-poi-
soning since the arrival of his boat
in the port, is much improved. He
was able to be out walking Sunday
afternoon, and it is thought he will
be able to leave the hospital within a
few days.
