

PULP WOOD'S DRAIN

On Forests Shewn to Be Very The forest service of the United States department of agriculture has furnished a preliminary statement showing there was used in the past year in the United States more than 3,000,000 cords of wood in the manufacture of wood pulp. The returns were from 150 firms controlling 232 mills. The wood used was divided among the various processes as follows: Sulphite, 1,538,000 cords; soda, 410,000 cords; ground wood, 1,068,000 cords. The total pulp production by all processes by the firms reporting was 1,-903,000 tons. According to the census

of 1900, the consumption of pulp wood was then 1,986,310 cords, so that there has been an increase of over fifty per cent, in the last six years. This de-OUTSIDERS AT WORK,

THE GOVERNMENT MAKES A CHARGE OF CONSPIRACY.

All Ranks Are Included Men Range From Saloonkeepers to Editors-Heavy Bonds Are

Portland, Ore., May 7.-Late Saturlay night, United States District-Attorney W. C. Bristol made public the names of twenty-one persons against whom a government land fraud indictment was returned by a federal grand jury. The indictment charges conspiracy to secure 200,000 acres of fine timber land in Crook Lake and Klamath counties, Oregon, .If the legations of the indictments are true the mode of operations was similar to those of nearly all the conspiracies which have been found in this state Warrants will be issued at once for the arrest of the accused, who range in occupation from saloon-keepers to lawyers, editors and business men.
