A BIG LAND FRAUD

THE GOVERNMENT MAKES A CHARGE OF CONSPIRACY.

All Ranks Are Included-Men Range From Saloonkeepers to Editors-Heavy Bonds Are

Portland, Ore., May 7.-Late Saturday night, United States District-Attorney W. C. Bristol made public the names of twenty-one persons against whom a government land fraud indictment was returned by a federal grand jury. The indictment charges conspiracy to secure 200,000 acres of fine timber land in Crook Lake and Klamath counties, Oregon, .If the allegations of the indictments are true the mode of operations was similar to those of nearly all the conspiracies which have been found in this state Warrants will be issued at once for the arrest of the accused, who range in occupation from saloon-keepers to lawyers, editors and business men. .
