YACHT CLUB HOUSE

TO HAVE A BOTTOM STOREY ADDED.

Only Minor Repairs to the Wharf. This Season—Boat Yard to be Taken Over—Another Meeting on Saturday Evening.

There was a meeting of the Yacht Club last evening to discuss the changes that were desired on the premises just purchased. Commodore E. C. Gildersleeve presided. The decision was of an informal nature, to give to the executive an idea of what the club wanted done. The executive will meet with the Yacht Club Association on Saturday evening to arrange the details.

It was practically decided that the club house would be raised by building a bottom storey. Only minor repairs will be made to the wharf this season, as it is intended next winter to build a pier out some distance. The boat yard and buildings now leased to Dr. Black will be taken over by the club on October 1st. It has not yet been decided as to the construction of a bowling alley or the re-leasing of the boat yard.

The Stratford Lacrosse Club has accepted the invitation of the Calumet Lacrosse Club, of Chicago, to play there on May 25th.

In the second Marathon race of the Missouri Athletic Club, at St. Louis, Irving Elliott, of Hamilton, stayed in front for the first fifteen miles, but stopped on a stone at that stage of the race and was practically put out of the running by the accident.

For a road race to be run at Niagara Falls on May 24th, Charles R. Newman and Charles Flynn, of St. Catharines, will give a cup, to be the absolute property of the winner. Entries open to Welland and Lincoln counties. The contestants will run twice round the town from City hall, Queen street to Victoria road, to Ferry Road, to River Road, to Bridge street, to Erie avenue, to the starting point.

The Stratford lacrosse situation has changed again. The intermediate team has decided to stick together and no players will jump to the senior team. As a result the senior team will be weaker. Brown Jackson, of Senaford, is in town to-day trying to organize a new senior league on an amateur basis, with two districts, one embracing Stratford, St. Catharines, Toronto Junction and another team and the other taking in Senaford, St. Thomas and other western towns. The idea is not popular in Stratford.

Successful in Florida. Dr. S. A. Aykroyd has just received a letter from his brother, W. H. Aykroyd, M.D., who is in Jacksonville, Florida, saying he was successful in passing the examination of the state board of physicians and has received his license to practice medicine in that state. It is generally thought that the examinations in the states are "easy" or a mere formal matter, but the doctor says this one "was no farce." He writes that the temperature in Jacksonville last week was ninety-three degrees in the shade, but was "not uncomfortable." There was no rain for a month, but fruit didn't seem to suffer on that account. Strawberries were plentiful at ten cents a box. However, the spring drought in Florida seemed to be somewhat of a drawback. MARINE INTELLIGENCE.

What is Going on About the Harbor.

The M.T. Co.'s, barge Colburn will go on the dry dock, when the Kingston leaves.

Swift's wharf: Steamer Hamilton passed up, last night. The steamer Picton, down to-day.

The yacht "The Sun" from Gananoque, with a party was in port yesterday and left to-day for Niagara.

The steamers Westmont and Fairmount with their consignees will arrive at the M.T. company elevator to-morrow.

M.T. company elevator: Steamers Dolanahanna, from Port William; with 90,000 bushels of wheat; Morley, from Duluth with 67,000 bushels of wheat. It is expected the steamer Kingston will be floated from the dry dock Thursday morning, when she will proceed to Toronto to finish fitting out for the season. This is the first time the Kingston has been on the government dry dock.

Large Amount of Grain. By the end of the week, about a million and a half bushels of grain will have entered the M. T. company elevator since the opening of navigation in the spring.

This is the largest amount that has ever come here from the west so early in the season. To-day over 150,000 bushels arrived, and to-morrow nearly 200,000. They will be brought by the steamers Fairmount, and Westmont and their consignees.

DOING GOOD WORK

REPORTS OF THE SOCIETY MOST ENCOURAGING.

The afternoon session of the Kingston Presbyterian Society was held in St. Andrew's church, beginning at eight o'clock. The devotional exercises were conducted by Mrs. Bennett, president of Chalmers church, W.F.M.S. The secretary, Miss Fowler, gave the report of the proselytism for the past year. The reports of the various auxiliaries were most encouraging. Last year most of the auxiliaries were visited by Dr. O'Hara, of Indore, and much good has resulted. One auxiliary reports at least one member in every family in the congregation; this is, at least, approaching the ideal. \$1,270 was contributed to the general work, being \$45 in advance of last year.

Miss Holden, Belleville, secretary of supplies, gave the report about the clothing sent to the Crossland school. Each year the quality of clothing has been improving, so that nearly all garments sent now are new, or nearly so. Eight large bales were sent, valued at \$472.

In view of the miraculous escape of the convict, there is little doubt but what he is armed, and judging from his capture, he is a most realistic fighter. There was a rumor at the penitentiary that he had crossed the river at Brockville into New York State.
