**"SWIPES" SILVER**

**FAMILY SERVANT STIRS UP QUEER SCANDAL.**

Junk Taken From Hotels Found in Von Wrede Castle—Princess Said to Be a Kleptomaniac.

Berlin, May 9.—William Glas, a former servant of Prince Adolph von Wrede, was arrested today on the complaint of the prince, who charges Glas with blackmail in connection with a quantity of stolen silverware, marked with the names of Paris and Berlin hotels, found in the silver room of Castle Borslow, near Malchin, Mecklenburg-Schwerin.

The Lokal-Anzeiger today asserts that Princess Von Wrede is known to have kleptomaniacal proclivities. It is reported that Prince and Princess von Wrede and Franklin Weddig, their housekeeper, will be asked by a Berlin court to explain the presence of the hotel-marked silverware in the castle.

The silver includes dozens of milk pitchers, sugar bowls, plates, tureens and salt cellars, largely plated, and it has been suggested that the collection was made by some one having access to the things from hotels as souvenirs.

The Von Wredes are a prominent family of Bavarian origin. Adolph von Wrede, who was born in 1849, first married a Hungarian lady, Ludmilla Moldaner, but this union was annulled by a Munich tribunal in 1890, and in the same year the prince married his present wife, who is of Spanish birth, and was a widow when she met Prince Adolph.

Deceased had been in feeble health for some time. She leaves one brother, Joseph Toronto, of Clayton, N.Y., and six children, Mrs. Joseph La France and Mrs. Leander La France, Gananoque; Mrs. Charles McNab, Orillia; Messrs. Frank and John Rolland, Orillia, and Joseph Rolland, Barrie. Deceased had lived here nearly fifty years. The funeral took place Wednesday afternoon, to St. John's church, thence to the Roman Catholic cemetery.

Neil McCarney, proprietor of the Provincial hotel, deserves credit for his action in the case of the mother's family, who were left in bad condition by the husband's sudden death. Mrs. McWilliams being left with seven young children, the oldest only about thirteen years of age. Mr. McCarney struck out at once to assist and by night had collected about \$80, which will help to no small extent. The unfortunate deceased had only \$1,000 on his life.

The late C. S. Taggart, Ottawa, formerly of Brockville, left an estate valued at \$23,000.

The letter is said to have been signed by the minister, and the woman's husband claims to have found scores of similar burning epistles which show the affection of the pastor for the farmer's wife. Mr. Taebler, when confronted with the letters by the official board of the church, resigned. A church trial will follow. Taebler is married, and has two children. Moore has asked a divorce.
