BY-LAW NO. 1906

A By-Law to Authorize the Issue of Debentures of the Corporation of the City of Kingston to the Amount of \$85,000 for the Purposes Therein Mentioned.

WHEREAS it is expedient to make certain additions, extensions and improvements to the gas plant and electric light plant the City of Kingston, Ontario; and WHEREAS the estimated cost of such proposed additions, extensions and improvements is \$85,000 and it is expedient to issue the debentures of the Corporation of the City of Kingston to raise the money to meet the same; and WHEREAS it is necessary to issue this By-Law to authorize the issue of the said debentures; and WHEREAS the amount of the debt to be created by this By-Law is \$85,000; and WHEREAS the total amount remaining in the Treasury of the City of Kingston as at the date of the passing of this By-Law is \$79,911.287; and WHEREAS the amount of the debentures to be issued is \$85,000, and it is the duty of the Corporation to raise the money to meet the same...

POWER FROM MOIRA.

Madoc Citizens Want Government to Build Dams.

Madoc, Ont., May 10.—A public meeting had been held to discuss the electric power question, more particularly with regard to the generation of power on waters in the county of Hastings. The subject was discussed by the mayor, Dr. Harper, who pointed out the importance of the power question to this town.

Mr. Wood said that the discussion of the great Niagara power had led to the proposal to develop power lying dormant in various parts of the Hydro-Electric Commission. In Hastings the Trent and Moira rivers and their tributaries are a rich source of power for the large-scale kind of manufacturing. This district was a wealthy one, with its mines, cheese factories and other industries, and with cheap power should be a thriving manufacturing centre. Joseph James, Actinolite, had a great deal of information regarding Hastings water powers. The government commission's report, he said, gave the power-night as 5,000 h.p. A dominion government report in 1880 showed the elevation of Loon Lake to be 870 feet above Lake Ontario. This represented enormous energy. Although the dam taking the place of lumberman's dams, now that the timber was gone, our chief source of wealth was our great water powers.

RAPID TYPING.

Austrian Woman Taps Keys 755 Times a Minute.

Vienna, May 10.—Fraulein Emma Weiss established herself as champion typist at a public competition held here.

There were three tests—"training," or writing anything which may come into the head of the writer; transcript from shorthand; and typing from dictation.

Fraulein Weiss was first in all three. In the first test she typed 755 strokes per minute, and 200 words in three minutes. In the transcription she wrote 180 words, with six mistakes, in five minutes, and from dictation 272 words, with 39 mistakes, in five minutes.
