**SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST
HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS**
Any even numbered section of Dominion
lands in Manitoba or the North
West Provinces, excepting 8 and 20, not
reserved, may be homesteaded by any
person who is the sole head of a family,
or any male over 18 years of age to
the extent of one quarter section, or
160 acres more or less.
Entry must be made personally at the
local office for the district in which the
land is situated.
HOMESTEAD DUTIES: A settler who
has been granted an entry for homestead
is required to perform the conditions
connected therewith under one of the
following plans:
(1) At least six months residence upon
cultivation of the land in each year
during the term of three years.
(2) If the father (or mother, if the
father is deceased) of any person who is
desirous to make a homestead entry un-
der this Act, resides in the vicinity of the
land, or if such person as a homestead-
er is required to reside in the vicinity of
the land, he may, in lieu of the residence
required by this Act as to residence
prior to obtaining patent may be
satisfied by a person residing with the
father or mother.
(3) If the settler has his permanent
residence upon the land, he may, in lieu
of the residence required by this Act as to
residence prior to obtaining patent, be
satisfied by residence upon the land.
APPLICATION FOR PATENT should
be made at the end of the third year, or
for the Local Agent, Sub-Agent or the
District Inspector.
Before making applications for patent
the settler must give six months' notice
in writing to the Commissioner of Dom-
inion Lands at Ottawa, of his intention to
obtain a patent.
**SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-
WEST MINING REGULATIONS.**
Coal lands may be purchased at
\$10 per acre for surface and \$20 for
subsurface. Not more than 800 acres can
be acquired by one individual or com-
pany. Royalty at the rate of ten cents
per ton of 2,000 pounds shall be collected
on the gross output.
Quartz—A free miner's certificate is
granted upon payment in advance of
\$5 per section for an individual, and
from \$50 to \$100 per annum for a com-
pany according to capital.
A free miner, having discovered mineral
in place, may, locate a claim 1,500x1,000
feet.
The fee for recording a claim is \$5.
At least \$100 must be expended on the
claim each year or paid to the mining re-
corder expended or paid, the locator may,
upon having a survey made, and upon
complying with other requirements, pur-
chase the land at \$1 an acre.
The patent provides for a payment of
royalty of 24 per cent on the sales.
PLACER mining claims generally are
100 feet square; entry fee \$5, renewable
yearly.
A free miner may obtain two leases to
area of five miles each for a term of
twenty years, renewable at the
discretion of the Minister of the Interior.
The lease shall have a dredge in oper-
ation within one season from the date of
the lease for each five miles. Rental, \$10
per annum for each mile of river front.
Royalty at the rate of 24 per cent col-
lected on the output after it exceeds \$10,000.

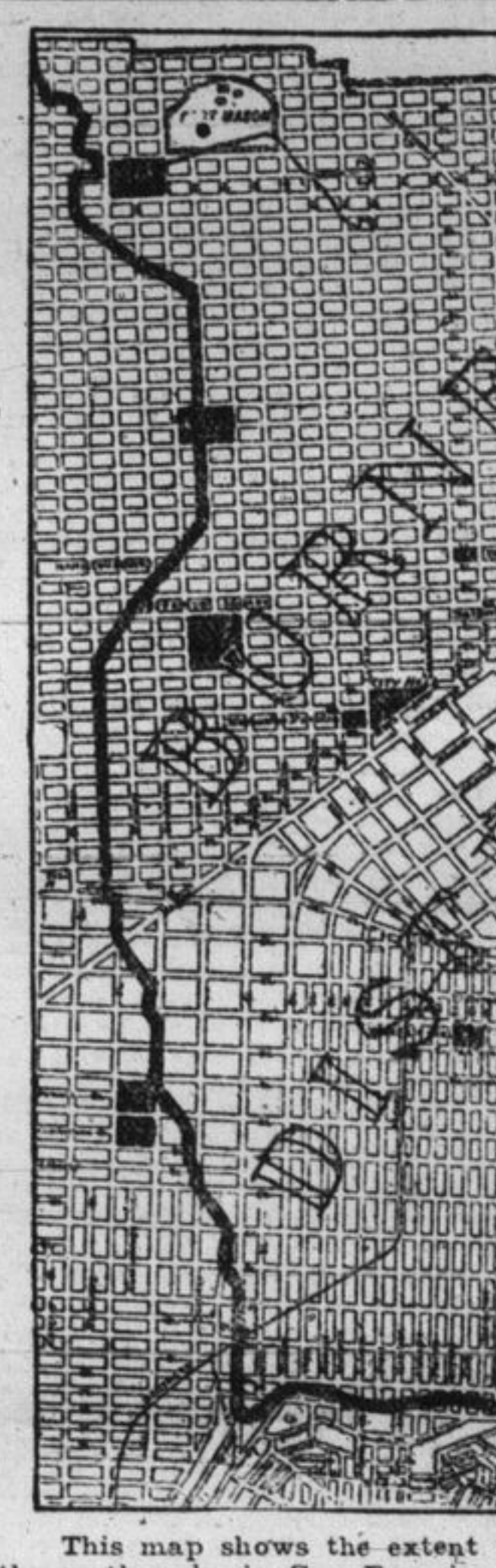

PERTH ROAD BOOK
**DR. EDWARDS BACKS UP HIS
REPORTS.**
He Explains the System of Book-
keeping—Only Undertook to
Examine Books After Great
Pressure, as Task Was Uncon-
genial.
Cataract, May 8.—(To the Edi-
tor) The letter of J. M. Fair, which
appeared in your issue of May 3rd,
makes it necessary for me to beg the
favor of a part of your valuable space.
In June, 1905, the county council ap-
pointed me to examine the books of
the Perth Road company and report
thereon, although I strongly objected
at the time, and urged the council to
select some other person for a task
which I felt would be uncongenial be-
cause of the unfriendliness existing be-
tween R. H. Fair and myself. In July,
1905, I went to the residence of R.
H. Fair, and made out my report from
a book showing the receipts and
disbursements for each month, and
one showing a summary of receipts and
disbursements under the heading



accounts did in 1901. Last March, R.
H. Fair appeared before the county
council and shared me with
officially representing him, and
his company in my report and
demanded that my report be expunged
from the minutes and even threatened
legal proceedings for damages.
I suggested that Mr. Fair be
compelled to pay for my report, but
he refused. He said I had willfully
left out nearly \$100 of money actual-
ly expended, and feared lest his in-
tegrity should be doubted. He pro-
ceeded to demand that I should pass
a vote of censure on me, or ask for
my resignation, or oblige me to offer
an apology to the company. He told
the council that he was willing to al-
low anyone to examine his books ex-
cept me, whom he accused of making
a willfully incorrect and misleading
report.
R. H. Fair was to be accused; R. H.
Fair was to produce the evidence. R.
H. Fair was to be prosecutor, R. H.
Fair was to be judge, and I was not
to be allowed to even look
on the fatal book from which the evi-
dence for my banishment was to be
drawn. I suggested that Mr. Fair be
compelled to produce his books, and
that the council appoint a committee
to examine the same, and compare

with my report. Councilors R. J.
Spoor and W. Pillar, were appointed
and reported sustaining my report.
Mr. Fair for some reason did not
produce the loss and gain account, but
that is immaterial, since he admitted
that so far as that account was con-
cerned my report was absolutely cor-
rect. The book produced before the
committee contained items in 1902
amounting to \$232.15, and were not
in the book last year, when I made
my report. R. H. Fair declares that
those items were in the book when I
examined it, and that I willfully left
them out of my report. He presented to
me, I am as well known in Frontenac
as R. H. Fair and I am perfectly will-
ing to let the people estimate my
statement and his declaration. I
want to say, however, that R. H.
Fair admitted before the committee:
1. That my report showed through
loss and gain account every dollar re-
ceived and every dollar paid out; 2.
That my report showed in the de-
tailed account and in the abstract
every dollar of revenue; 3. That my
report showed in each year exactly
to a cent the cash balance from the
previous year; 4. That my report com-
pleted the statement of the company
beginning 1905 with \$135.72 cash on
hand which R. H. Fair said was correct.
Items which he said I left out on
the page of my report, were on the same
page of the book produced to the com-
mittee, and immediately below others
which I included in my report. If those
items had been there last July, I
could not fail to see them, and why
should I omit the very items which
would give me the exact amount re-
quired to produce the same total in
the detailed statement of money ex-
pended, which I had already obtained
in the other account the summary of
money expended? I have never hint-
ed that the Perth Road company's
money was not duly accounted for,
and my report makes such a surmise
impossible to anyone of ordinary in-
telligence. In conclusion, I would add
that I shall not criticize the letter of
J. M. Fair as I might and could now
shall I allow myself to be provoked
into any controversy with that gentle-
man. If he really believed that my
statement before the council was an
impairment of his character, he was
justified in writing to the press to
clear himself. In so far, however, as
it seemed to him necessary to reflect
on my character to clear his own, I
claim the right to retort. In your
issue with this letter, thanking you,
Mr. Editor, I remain yours sincerely,
